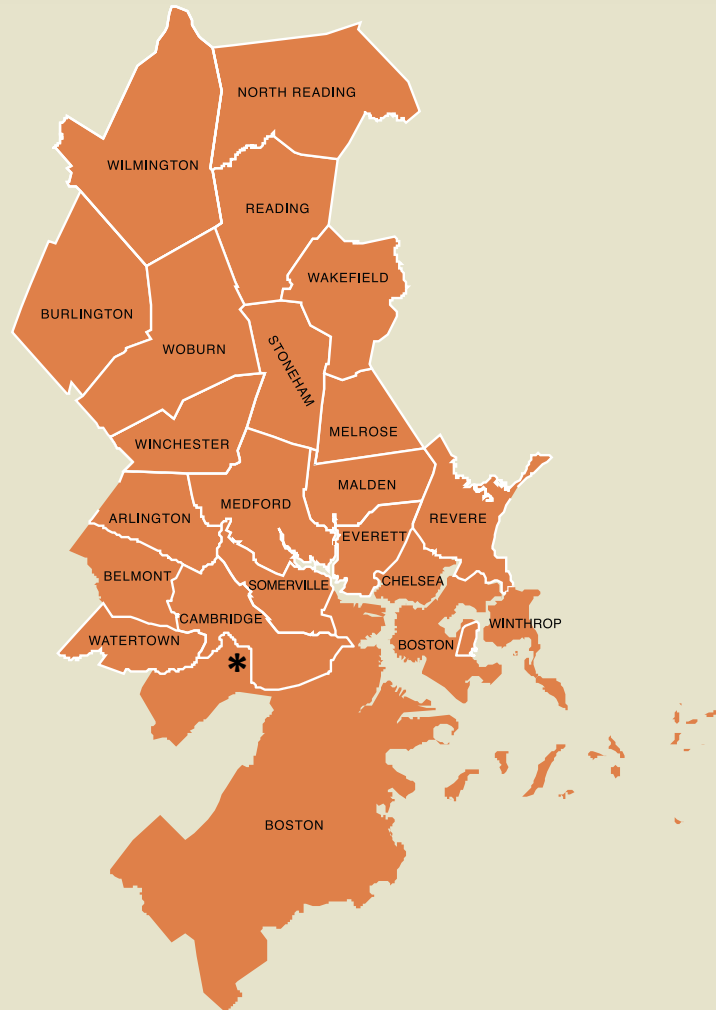

Motivation

- Provide detailed data on labor supply and demand trends to support workforce development policy discussions at a local level.

Summary

- Boston/Metro North has had one of the strongest regional labor market recoveries, due largely to gains in 2011.
- With a young and educated labor force, Boston/Metro North does not have some of the demographics challenges facing most other regional labor markets.
- The region employs the most highly educated workforce in the state and has a strong demand for post-secondary educated labor.
- However, there are still a large number of residents who lack a post-secondary education and face challenges to participating fully in the Boston/Metro labor market.

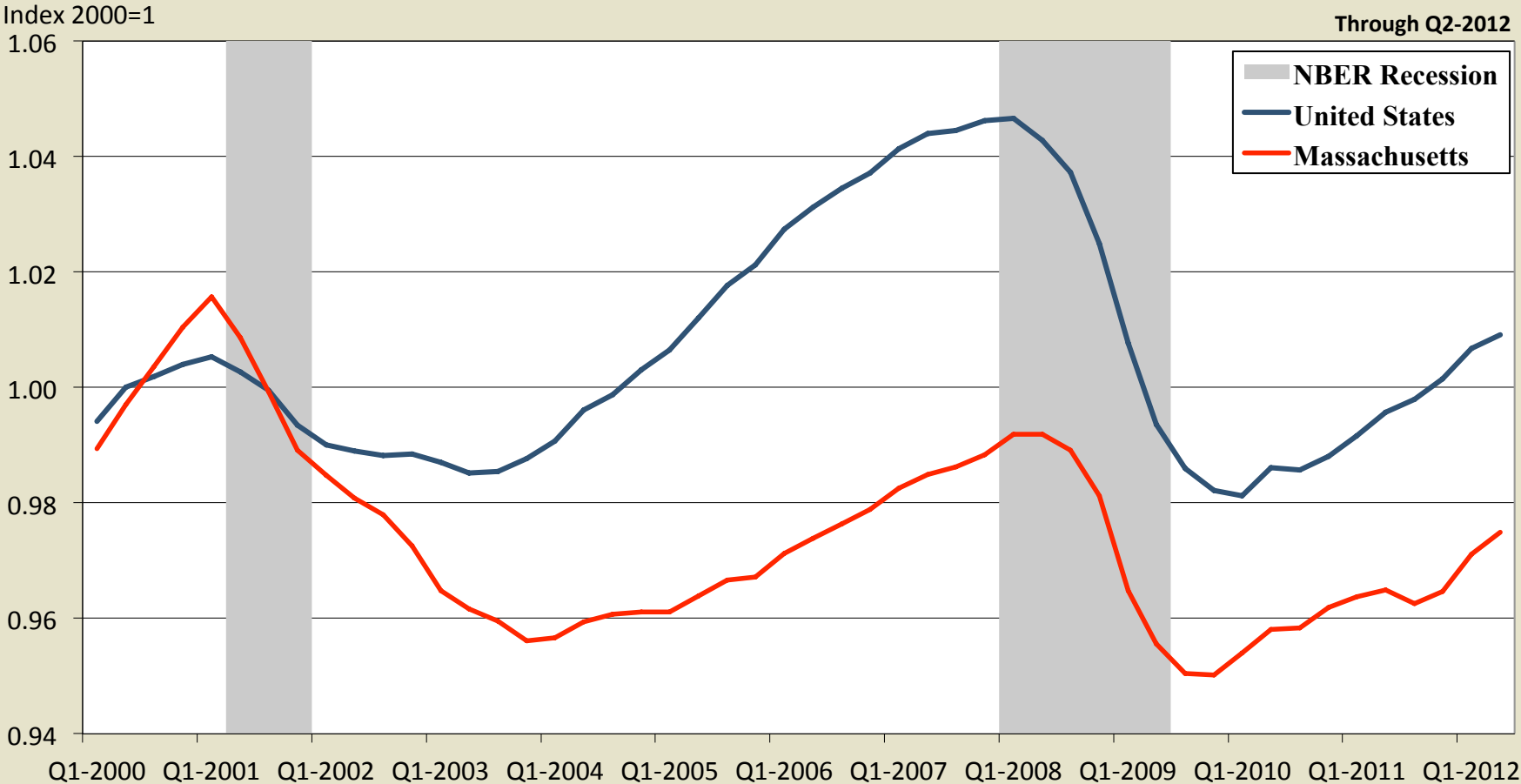

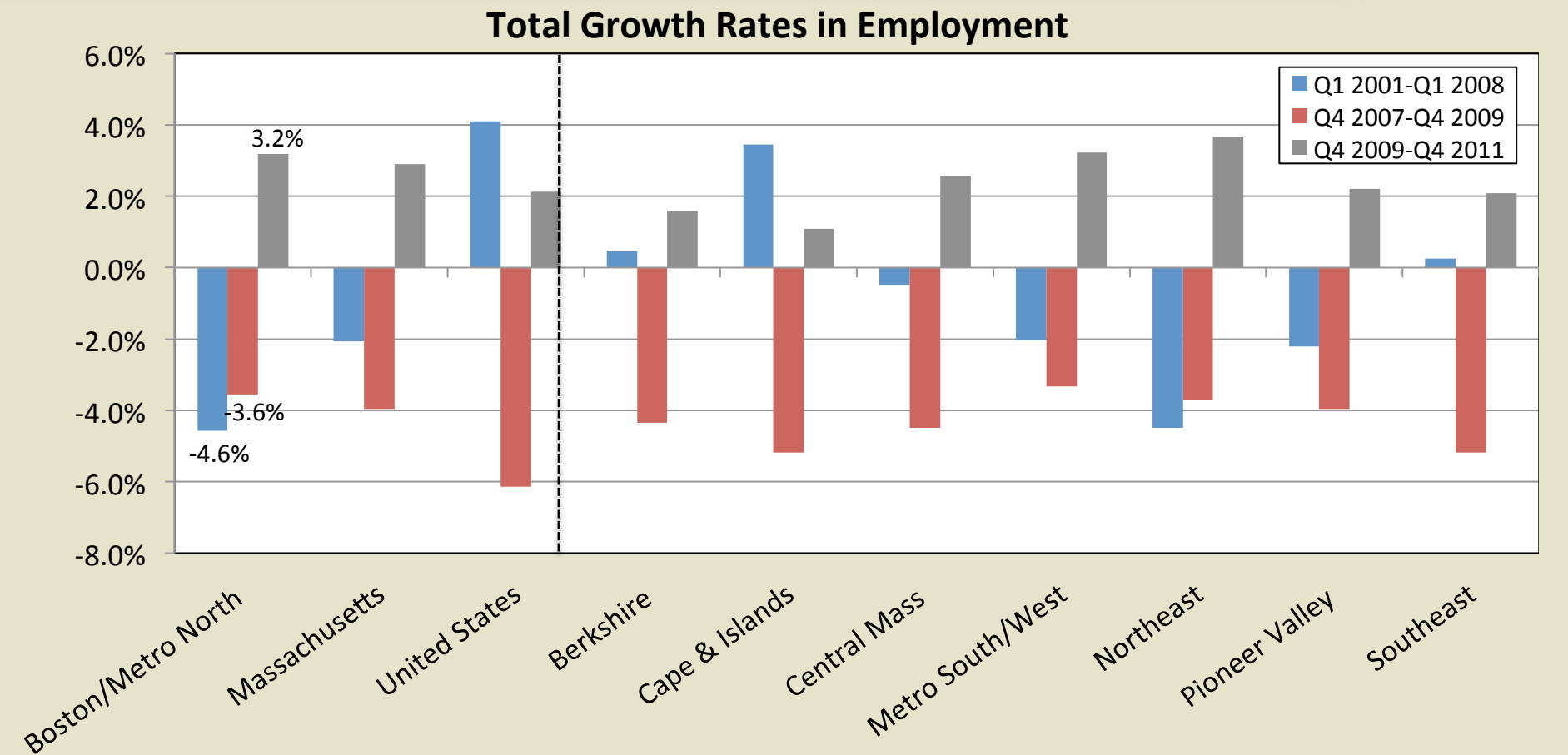
Massachusetts is still far below its peak employment levels of the early 2000's.

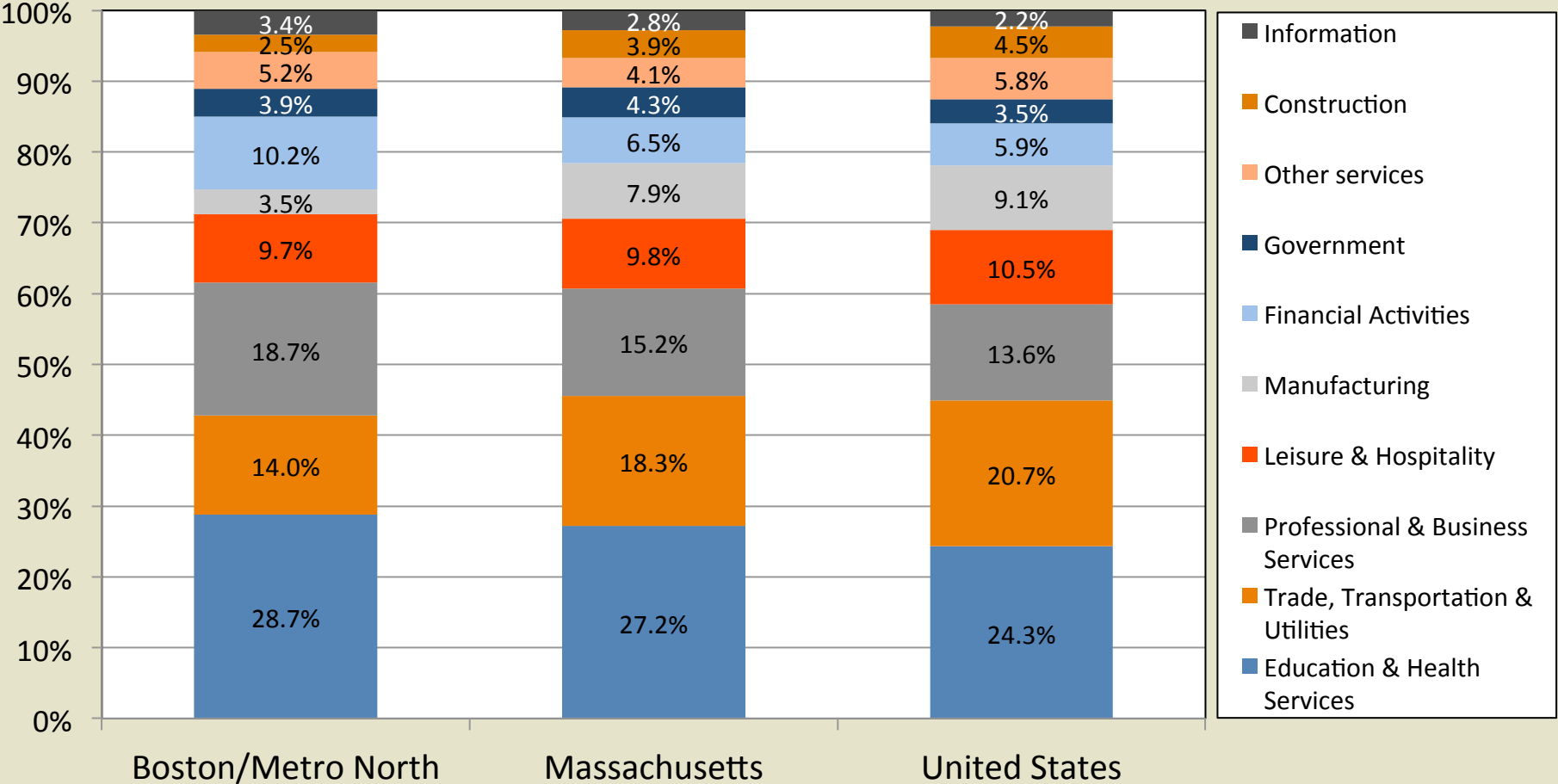
Boston/Metro North has had one of the strongest regional labor market recoveries, due largely to employment gains in 2011.

Boston/Metro North has stronger concentrations in Financial Activities and Professional & Business Services.

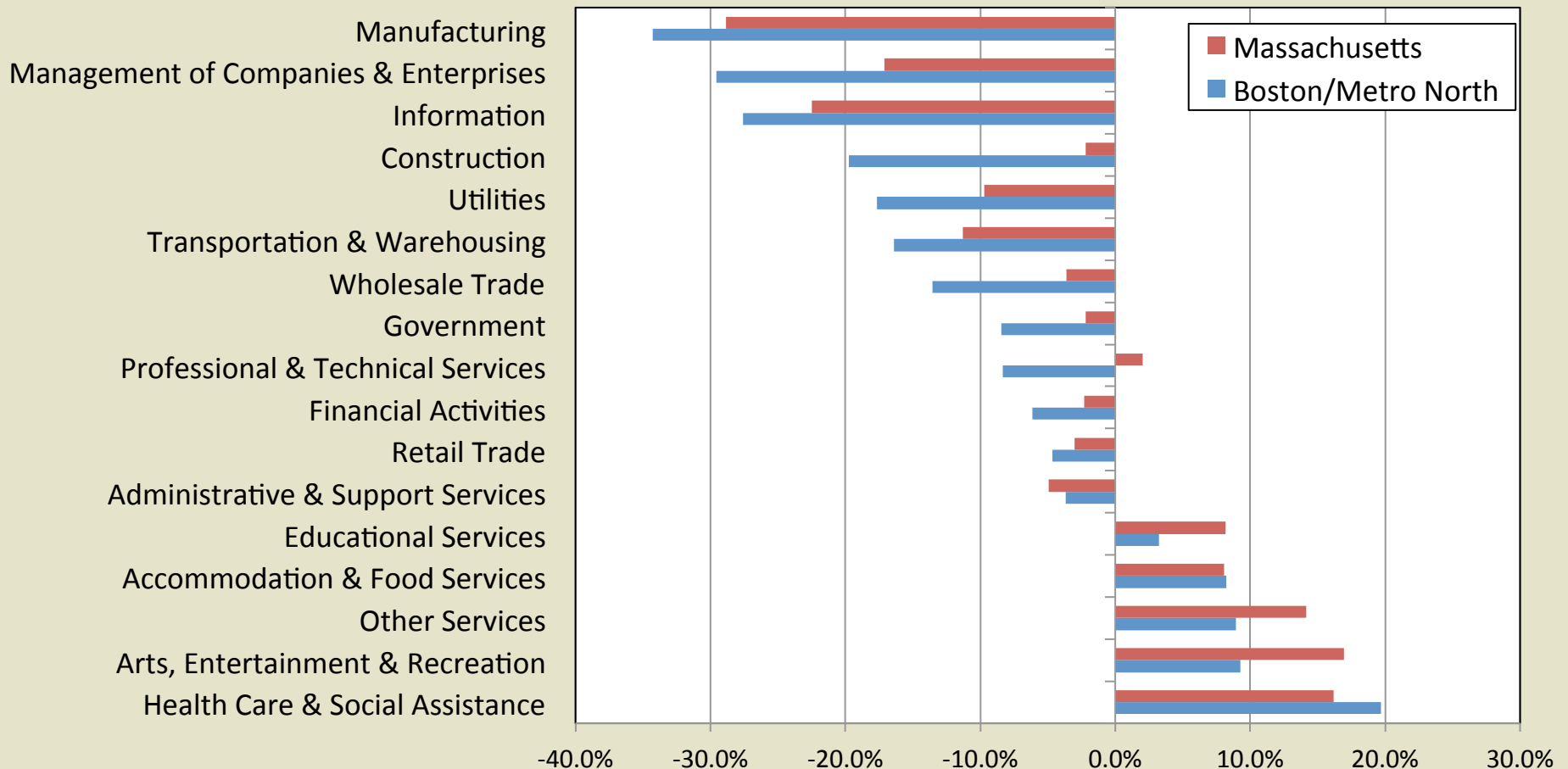
Employment Distribution by Supersector, Q4 2011

The region had steeper employment losses and weaker gains in nearly every major industry between recessions.

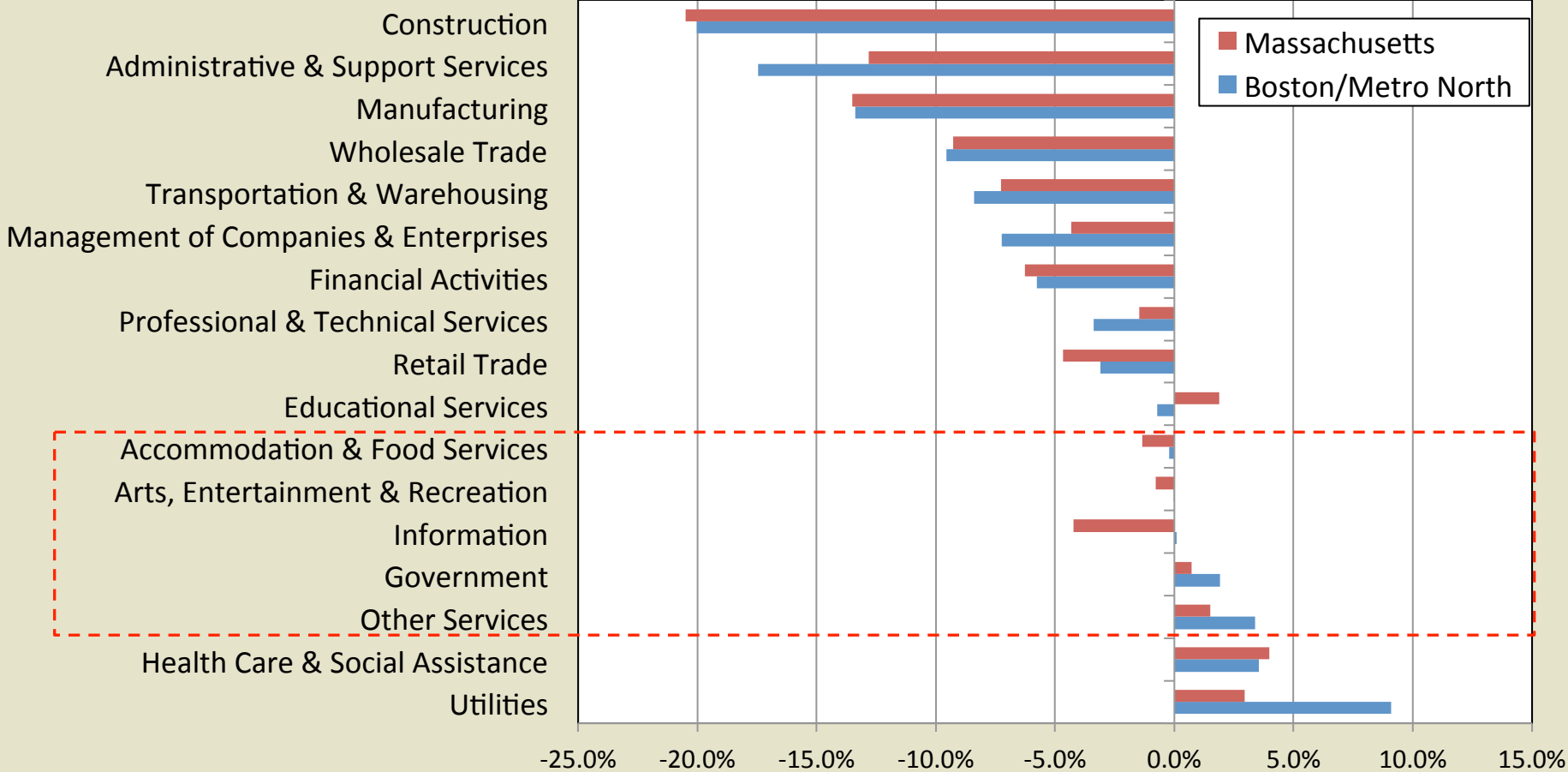
Employment Changes, Q1-2001 to Q1-2008

In the Great Recession Boston/Metro North shed jobs in most major industries, with gains limited to only five industries.

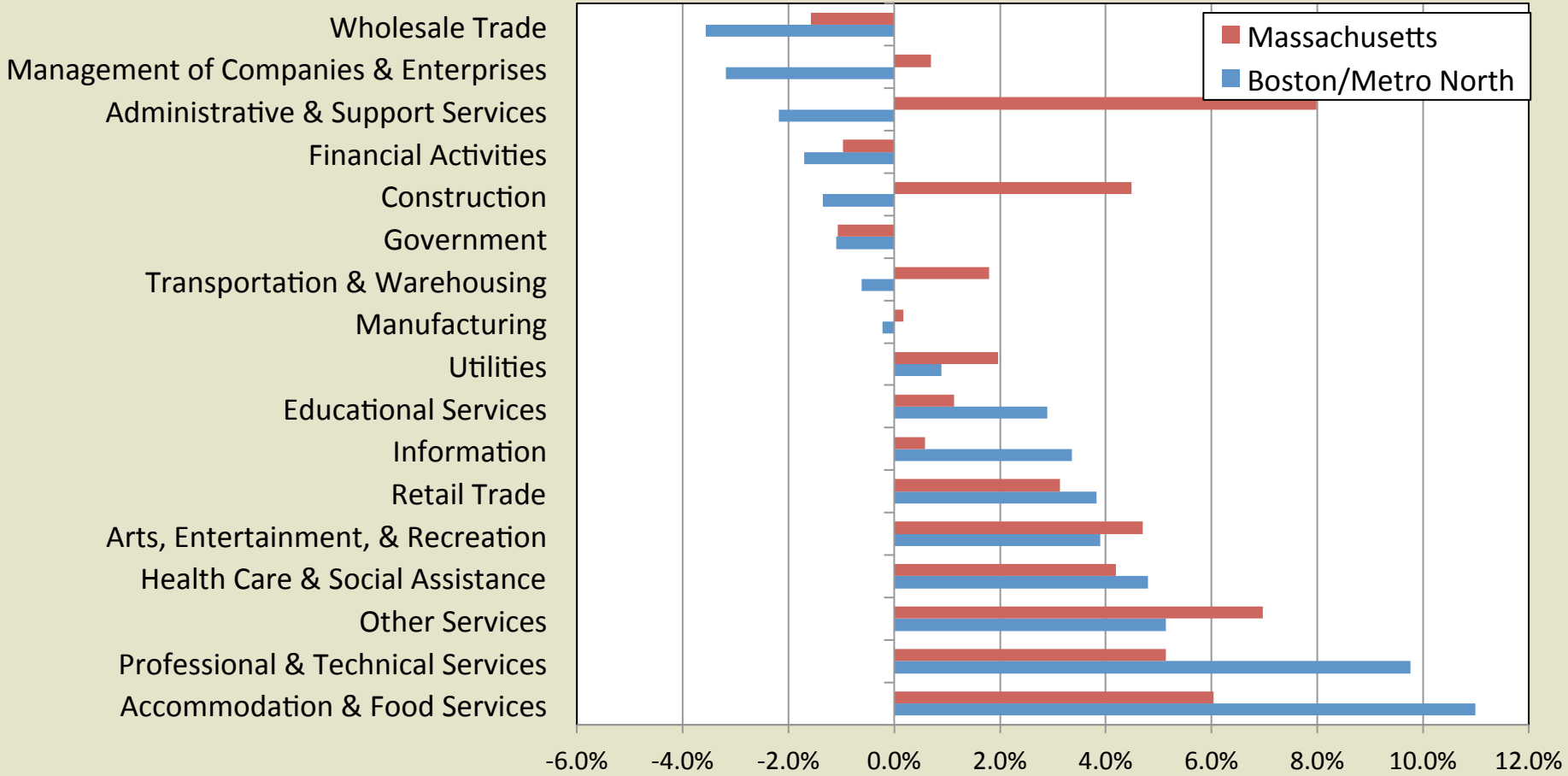
Employment Changes, Q4-2007 to Q4-2009

Employment Changes, Q4-2009 to Q4-2011

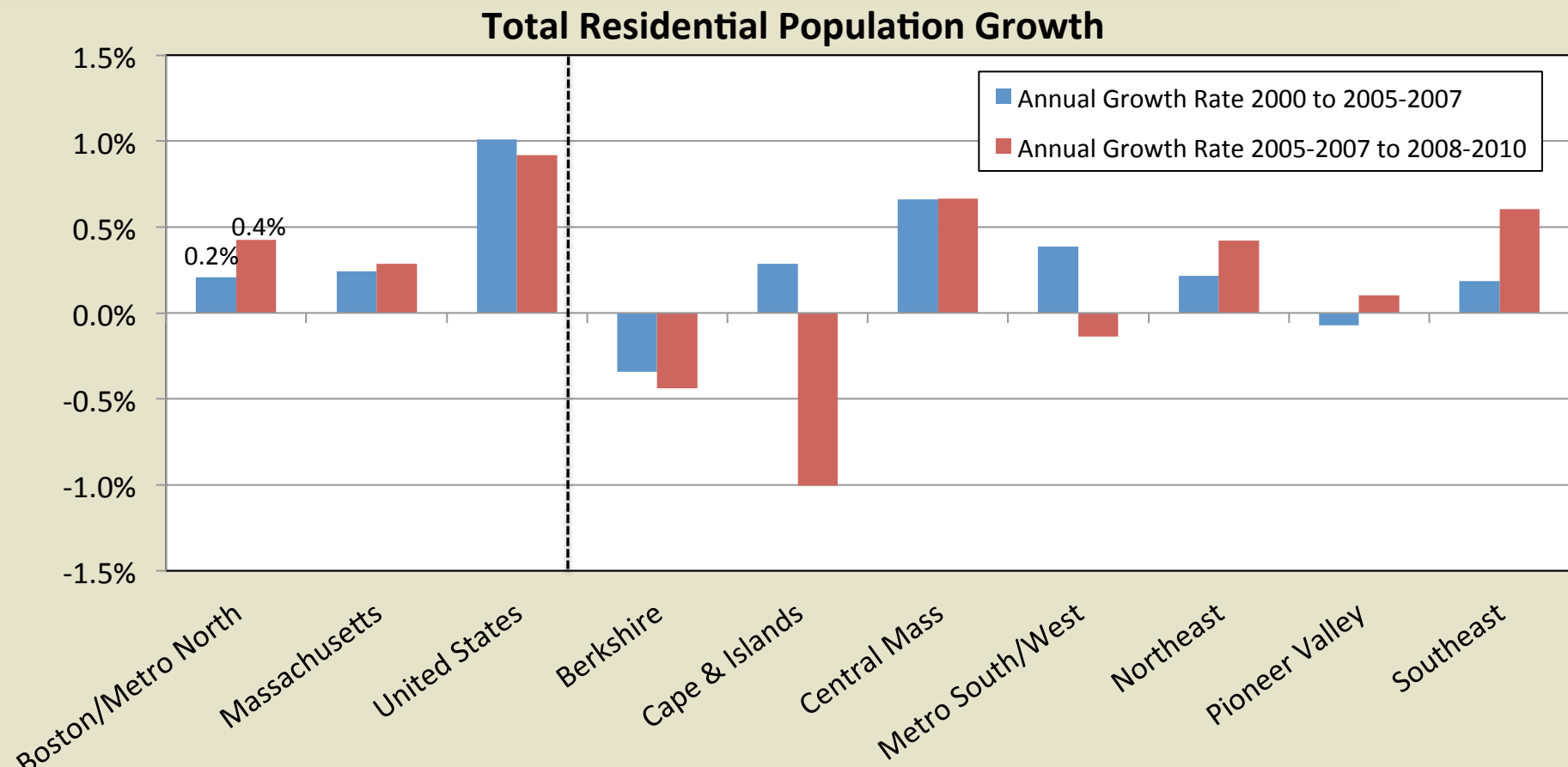

The growth of the residential population in the region has exceeded statewide rates but trailed national trends.

Growth in immigrant and minority populations have offset losses of native born and white, non-Hispanic residents.

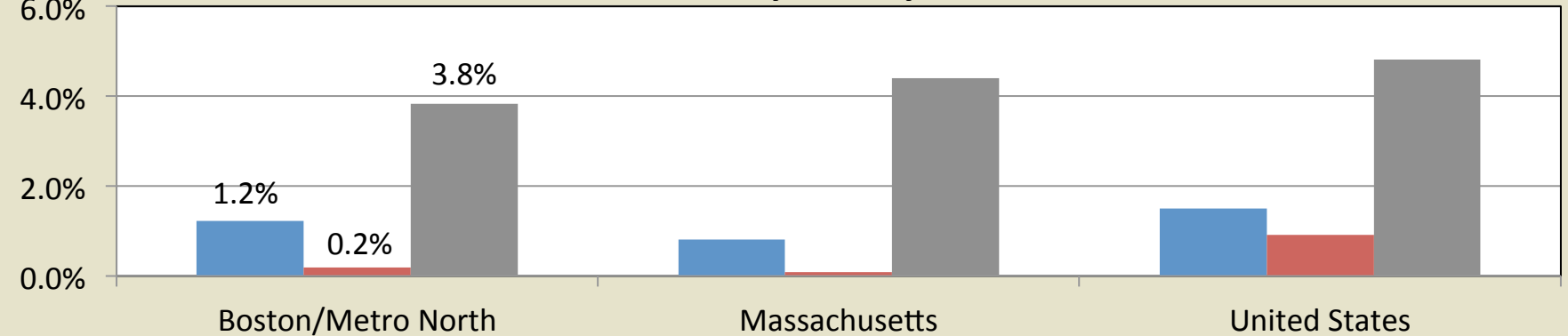

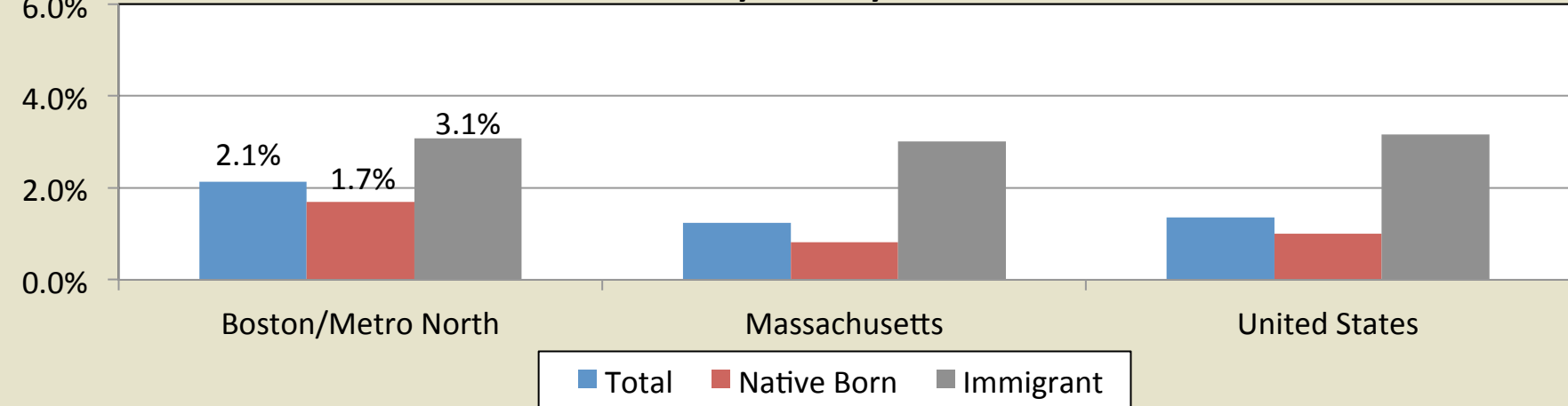

Civilian Labor Force Growth by Nativity Status, 2000 to 2005-2007



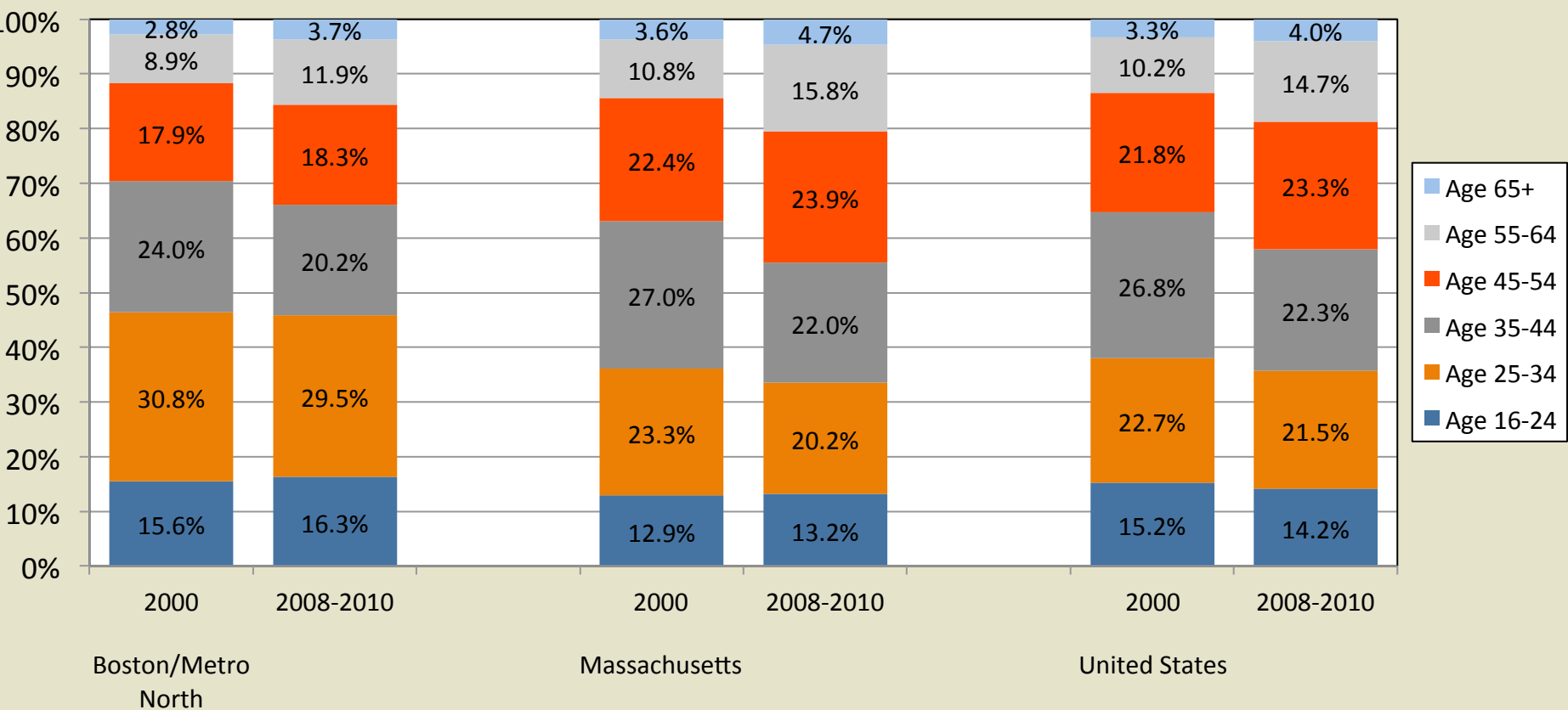
Civilian Labor Force Growth by Nativity Status, 2005-2007 to 2008-2010

Boston/Metro North has the youngest labor force in the state, with nearly 46 percent age 34 or younger.

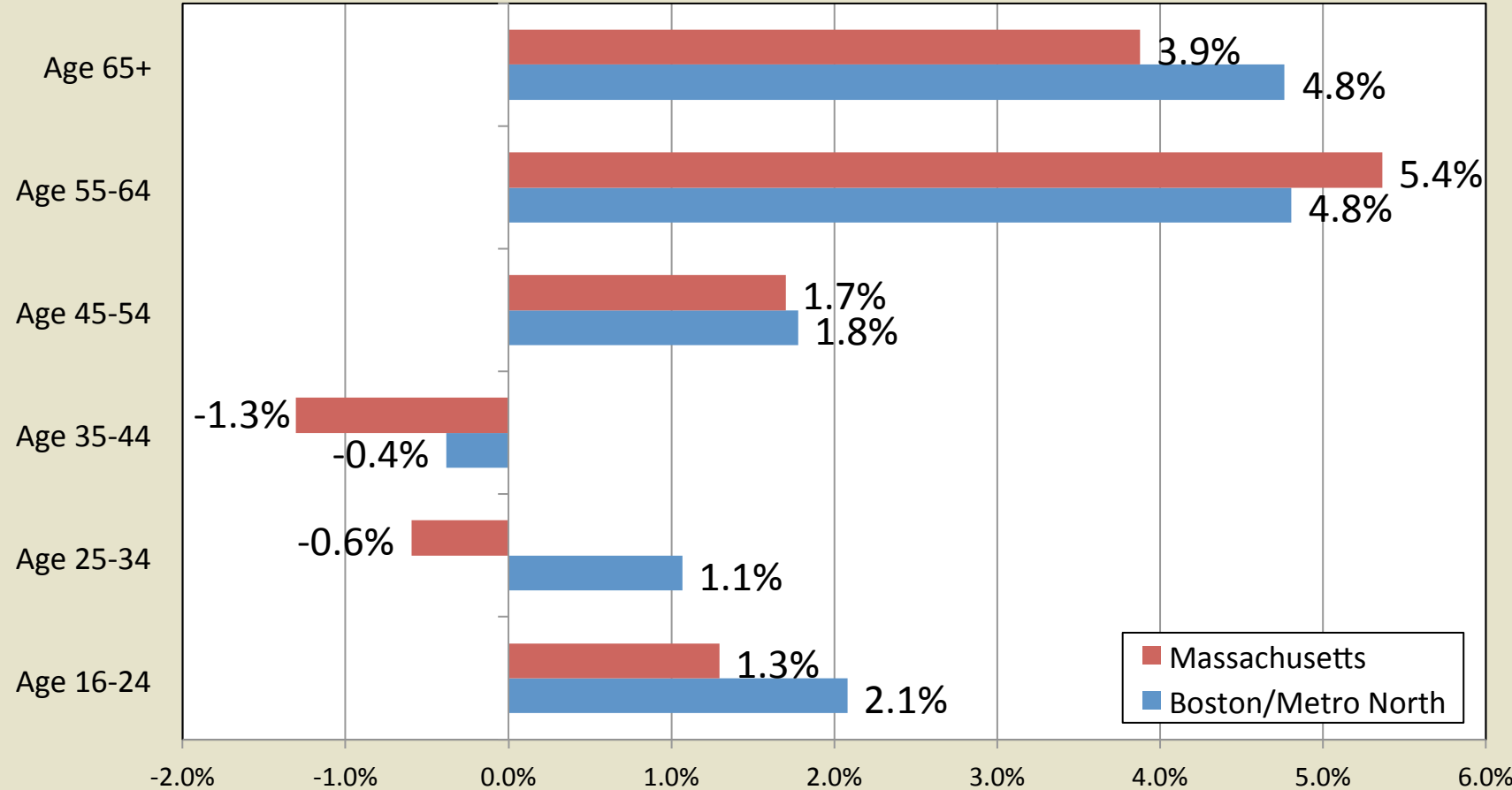
Age Distribution of the Civilian Labor Force

Boston/Metro North was the only regional labor market to increase the number of 25-34 year olds in the labor force.

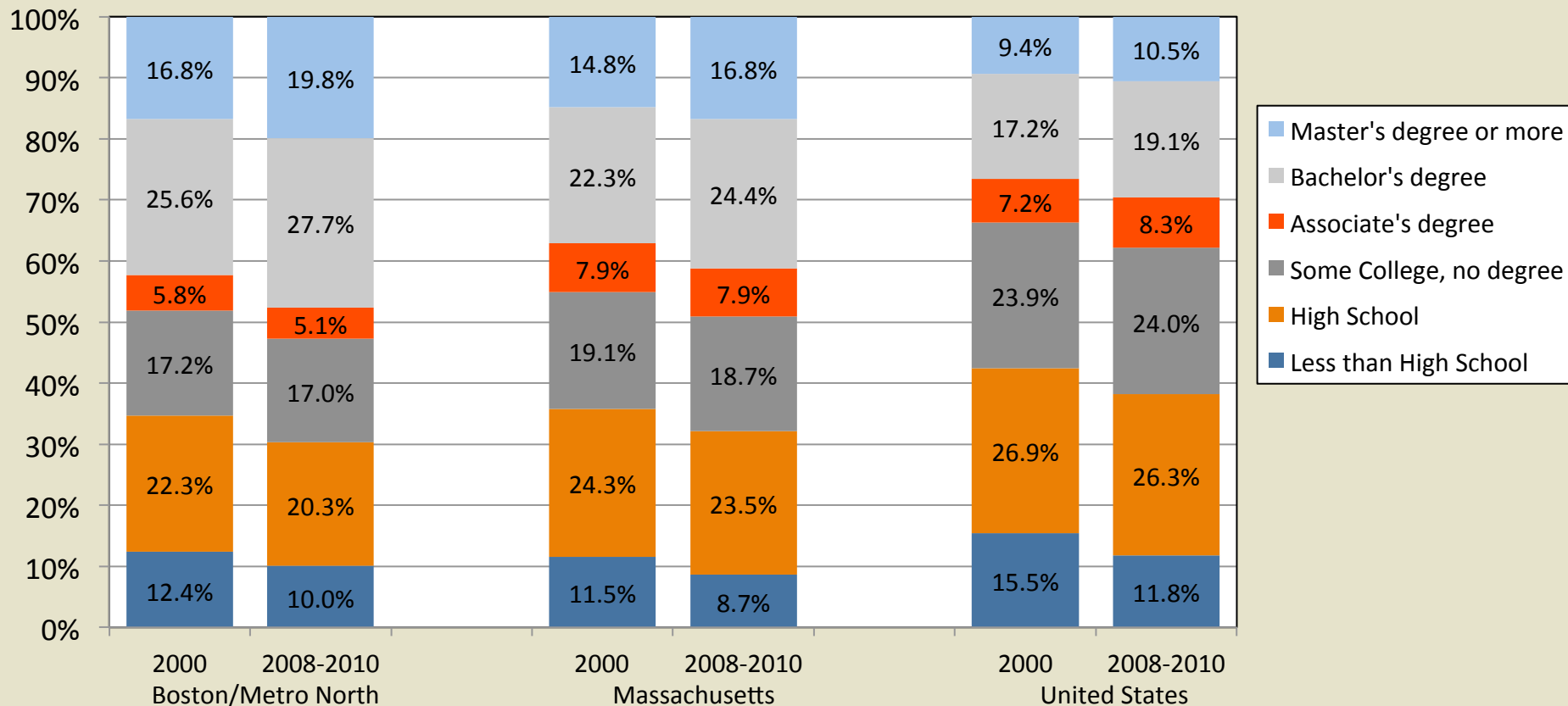
Annual Growth in the Civilian Labor Force by Age, 2000 to 2008-2010

The region has one of the most educated labor forces in the state, as nearly 48 percent have a Bachelor's Degree or higher.

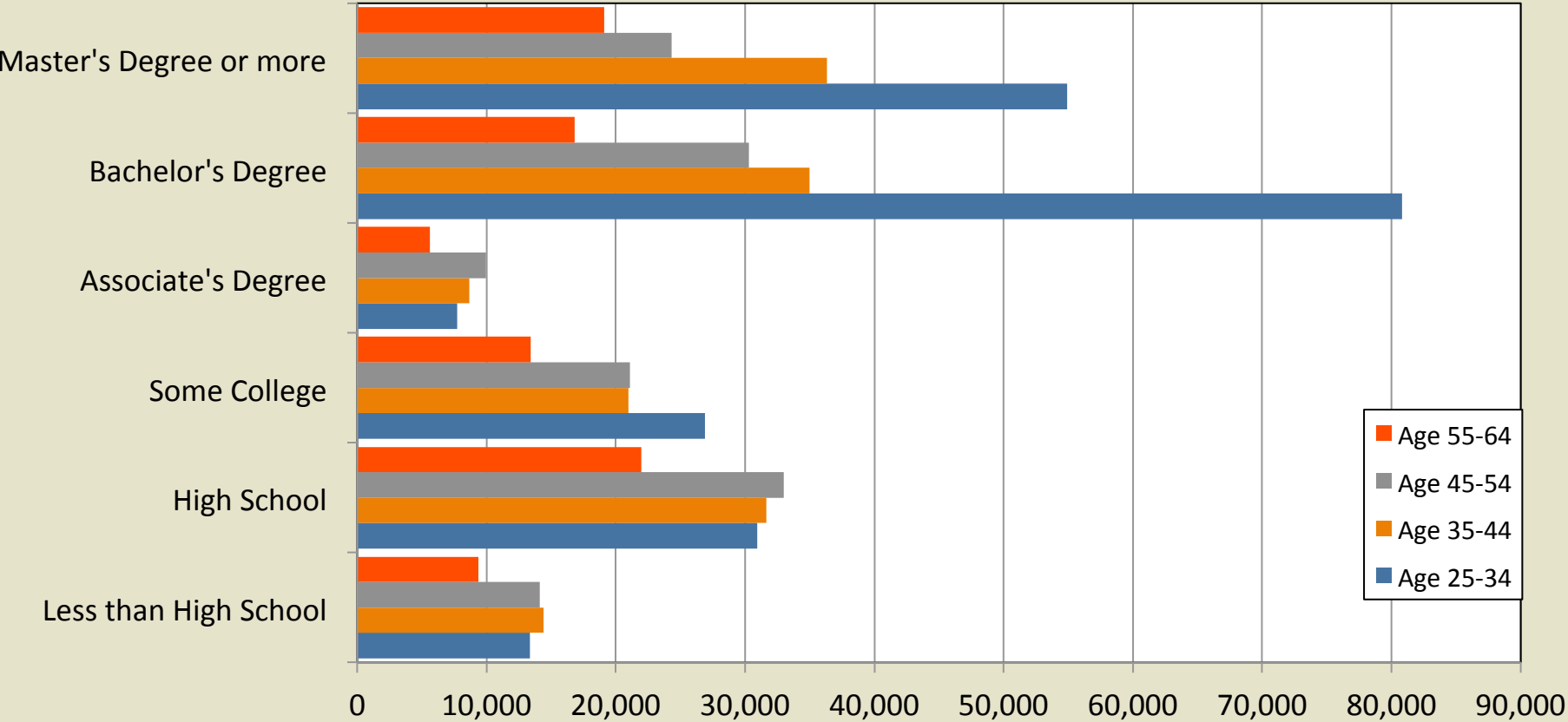
Educational Attainment of the Civilian Labor Force

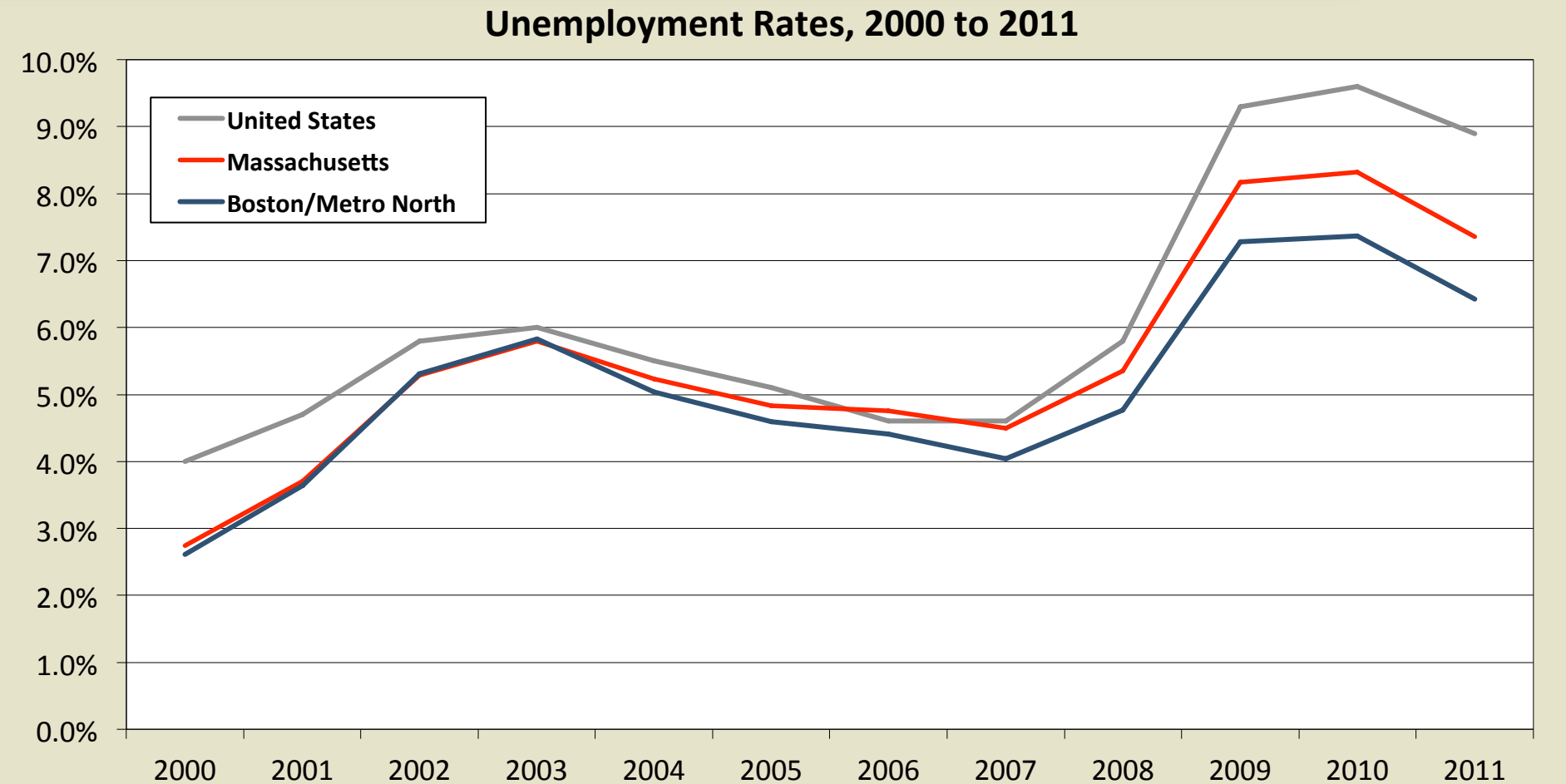
The combination of a young and highly educated labor force mitigates some of the challenges facing other labor markets.

Educational Attainment of the Civilian Labor Force in Boston/Metro North



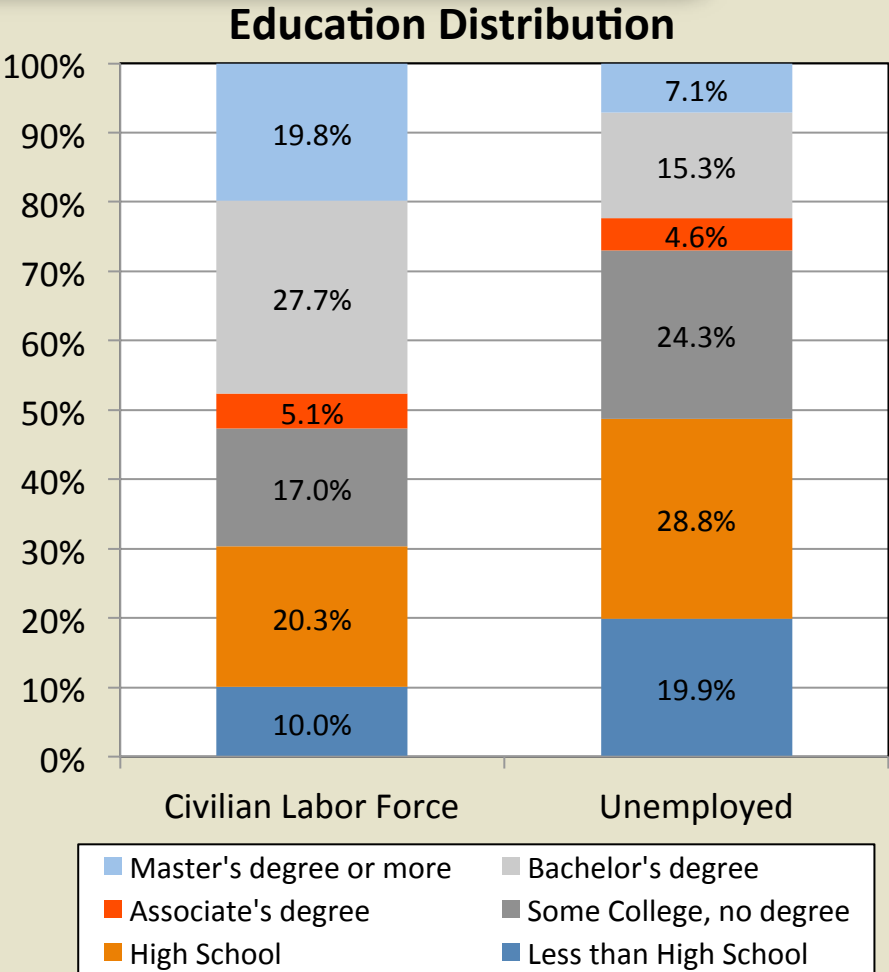
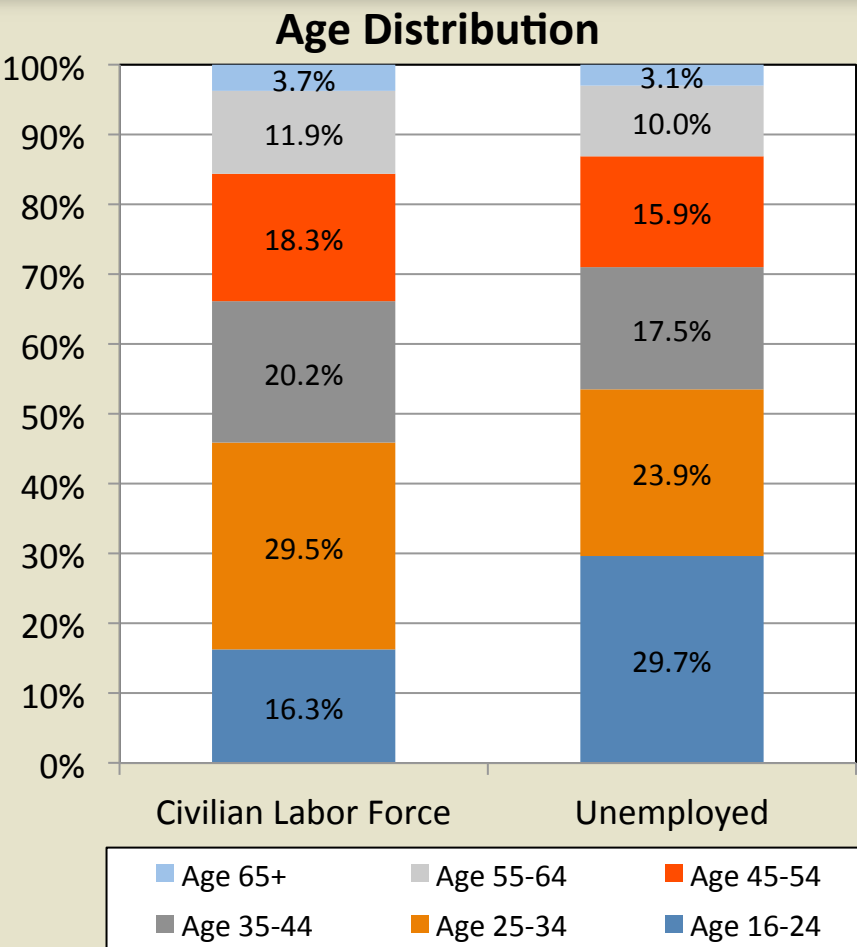

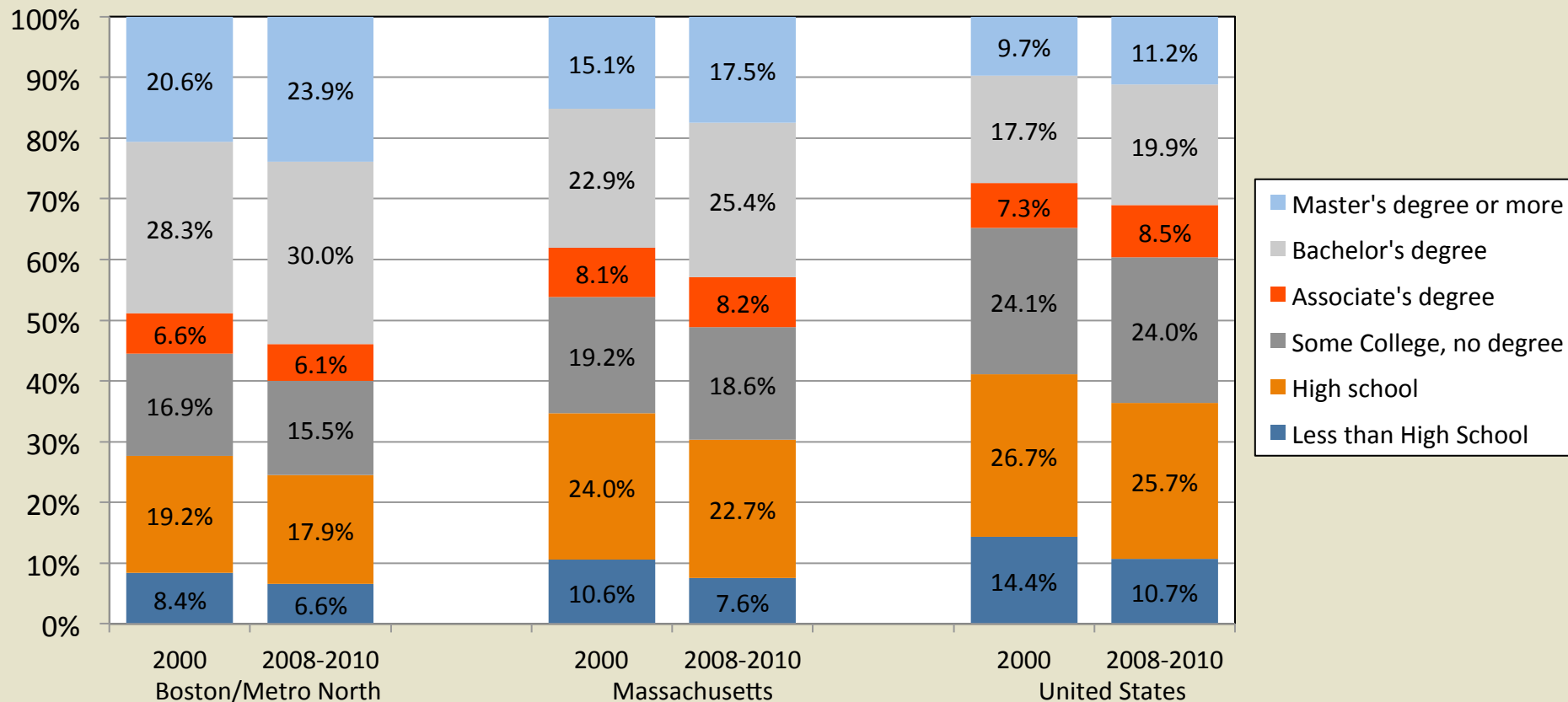

Labor Demand

- Educational Attainment of Employed
- Educational Attainment and Composition of Industries and Occupations
- Demand for Workers with Post-Secondary Education Pre- and Post-Recession

The region employs the most educated workforce in the state, with nearly 54 percent having a Bachelor's Degree or higher.

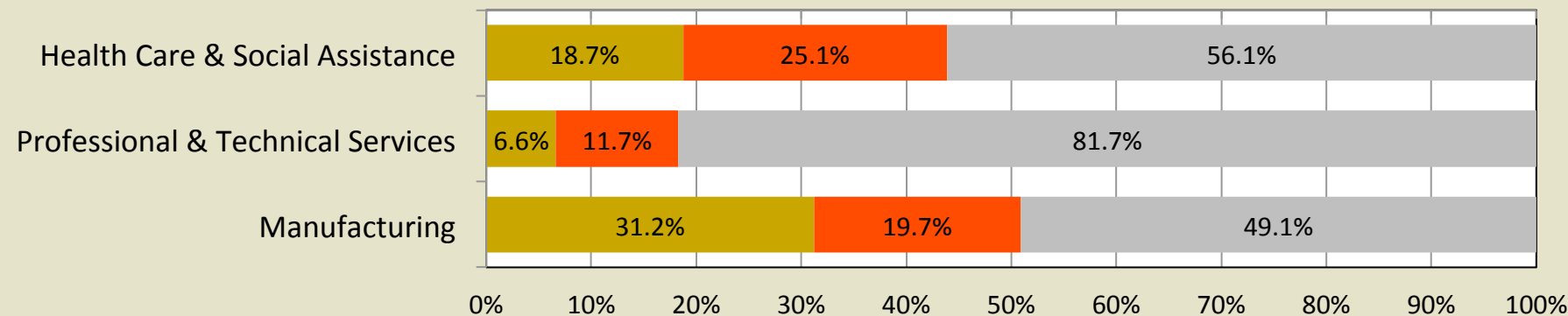
Educational Attainment of Individuals Employed in Region



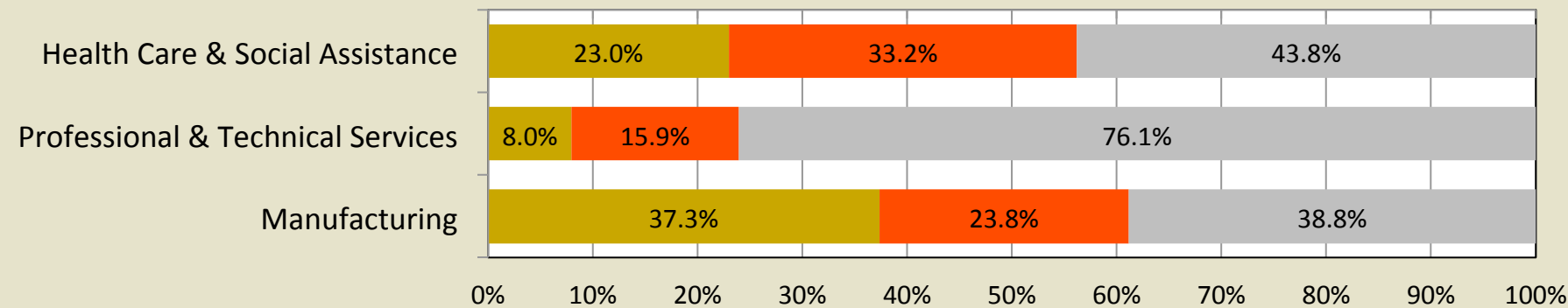

Educational Attainment of Employees by Selected Major Industry in Massachusetts

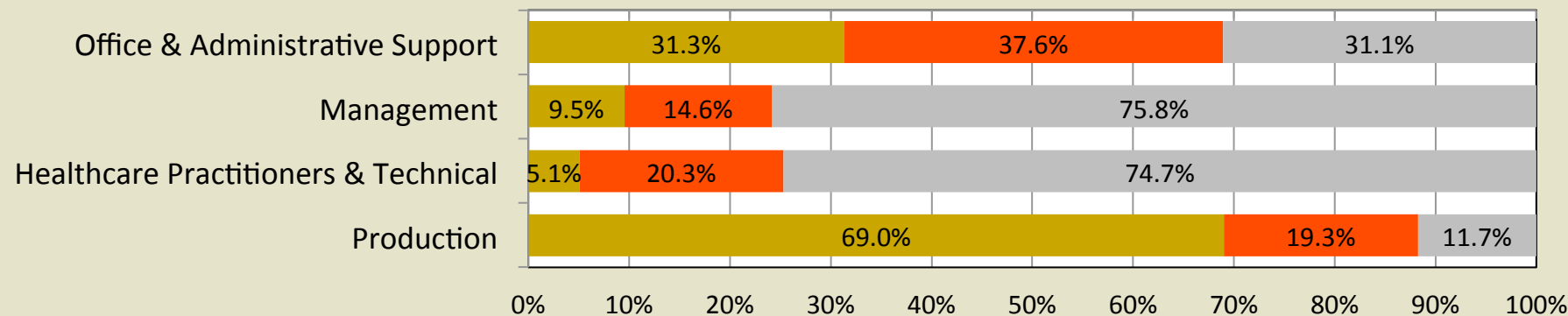

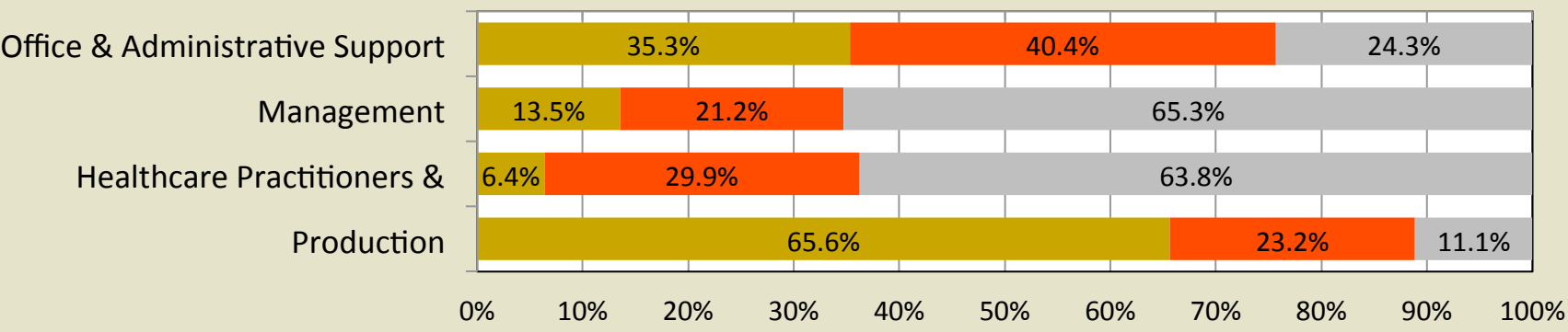

Educational Attainment of Employees by Selected Occupation in Massachusetts

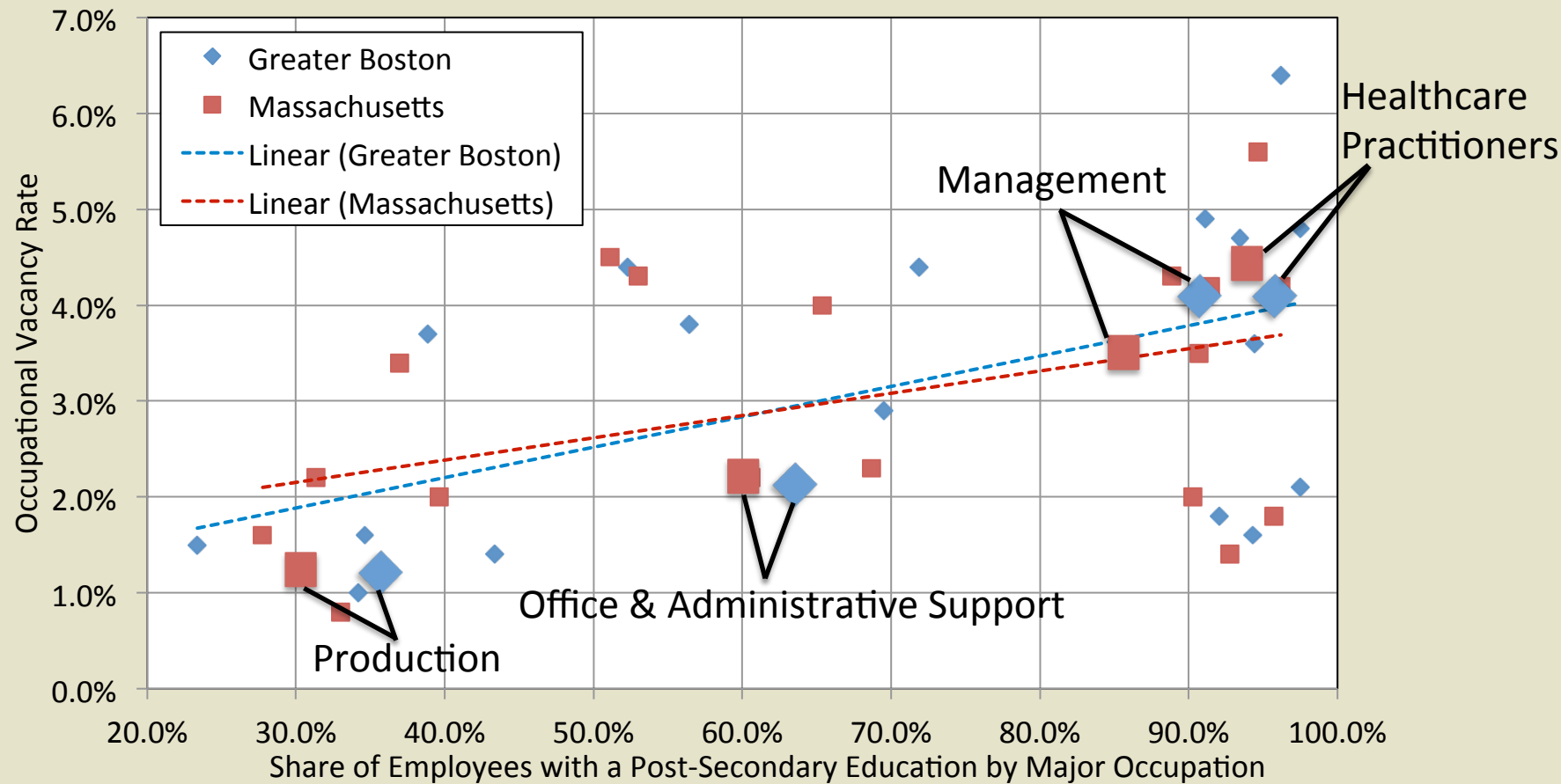


■ High School Degree or Less ■ Some College or Associate's Degree ■ Bachelor's Degree or Higher

Prior to the recession there were higher vacancy rates in the more highly educated occupations than in the less educated...

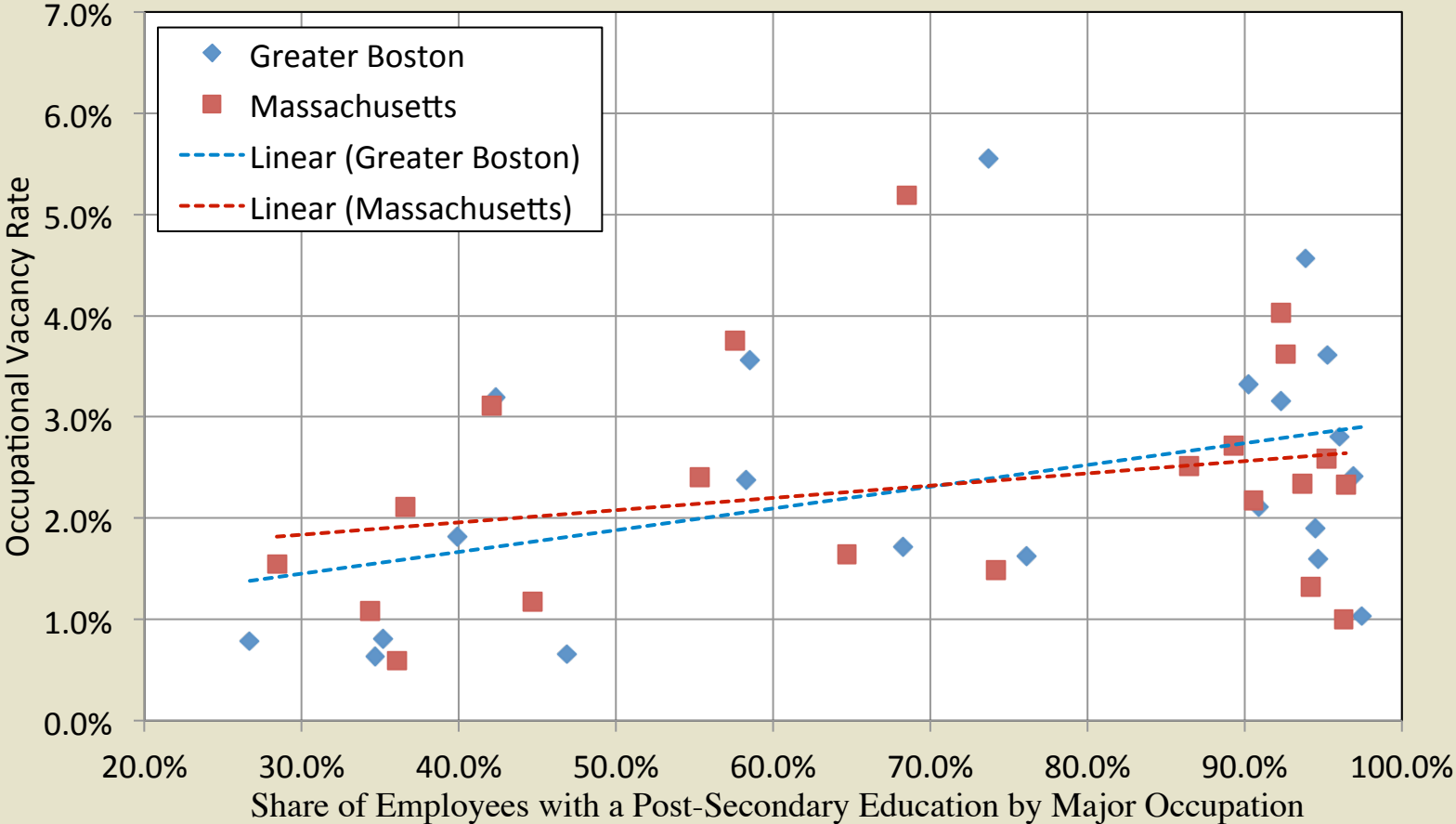
Job Vacancies and Educational Attainment by Occupation, Pre-Recession

Job Vacancies and Educational Attainment by Occupation, Post-Recession

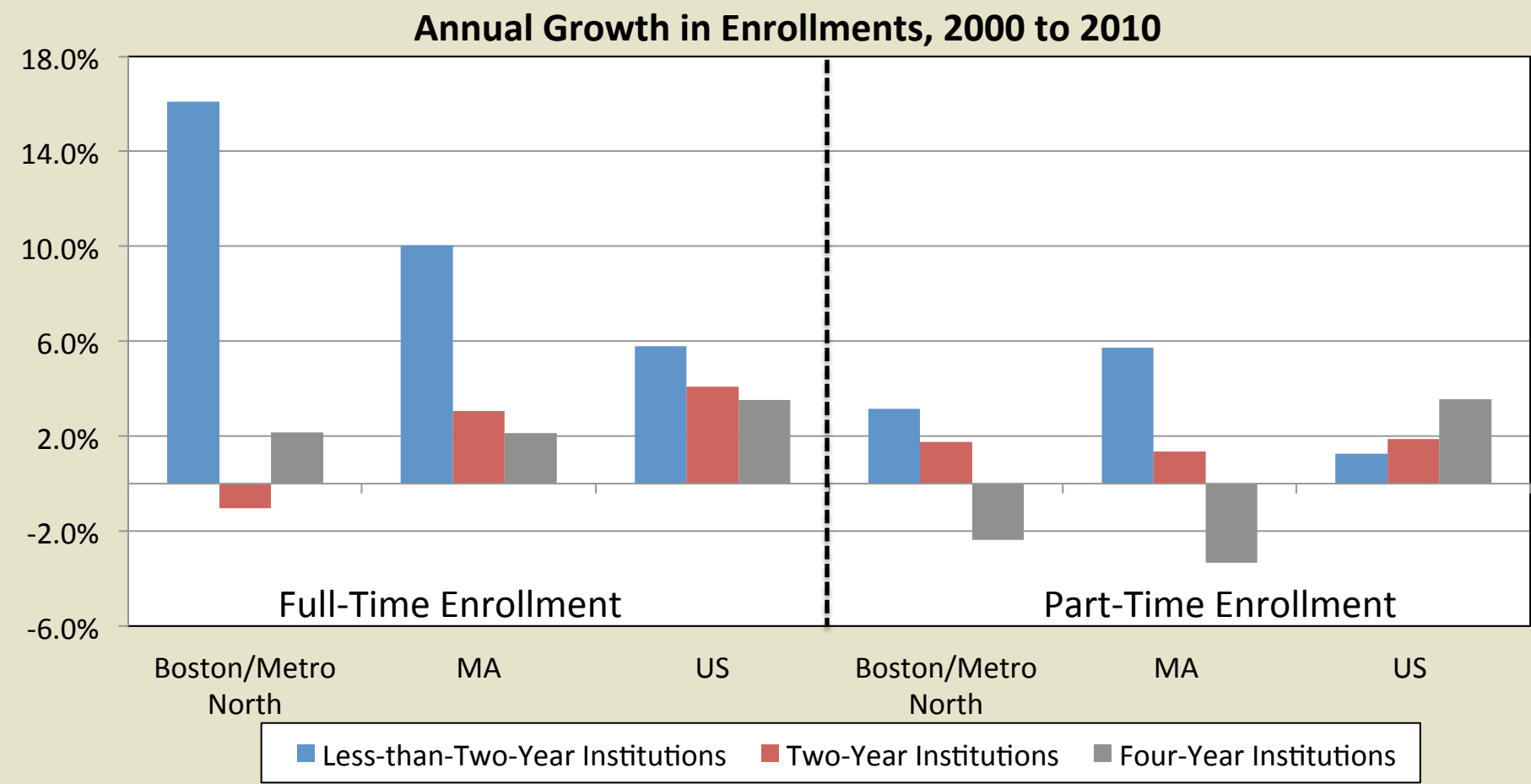

- Degree Completions

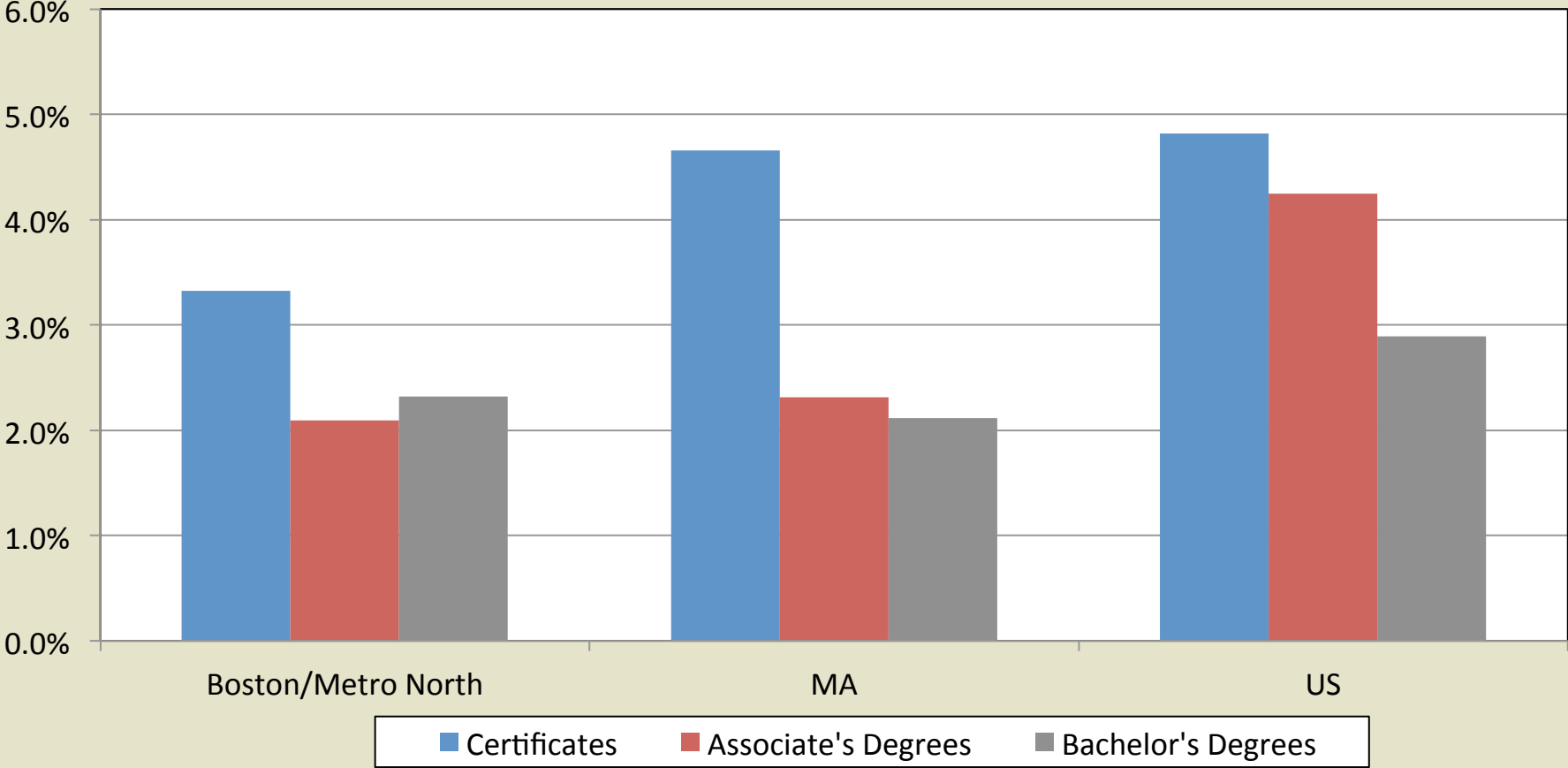
Enrollment at higher educational institutions in the region has varied by type of institution and enrollment status.

Growth in completions at institutions in Boston/Metro North has lagged those of institutions statewide and nationally.

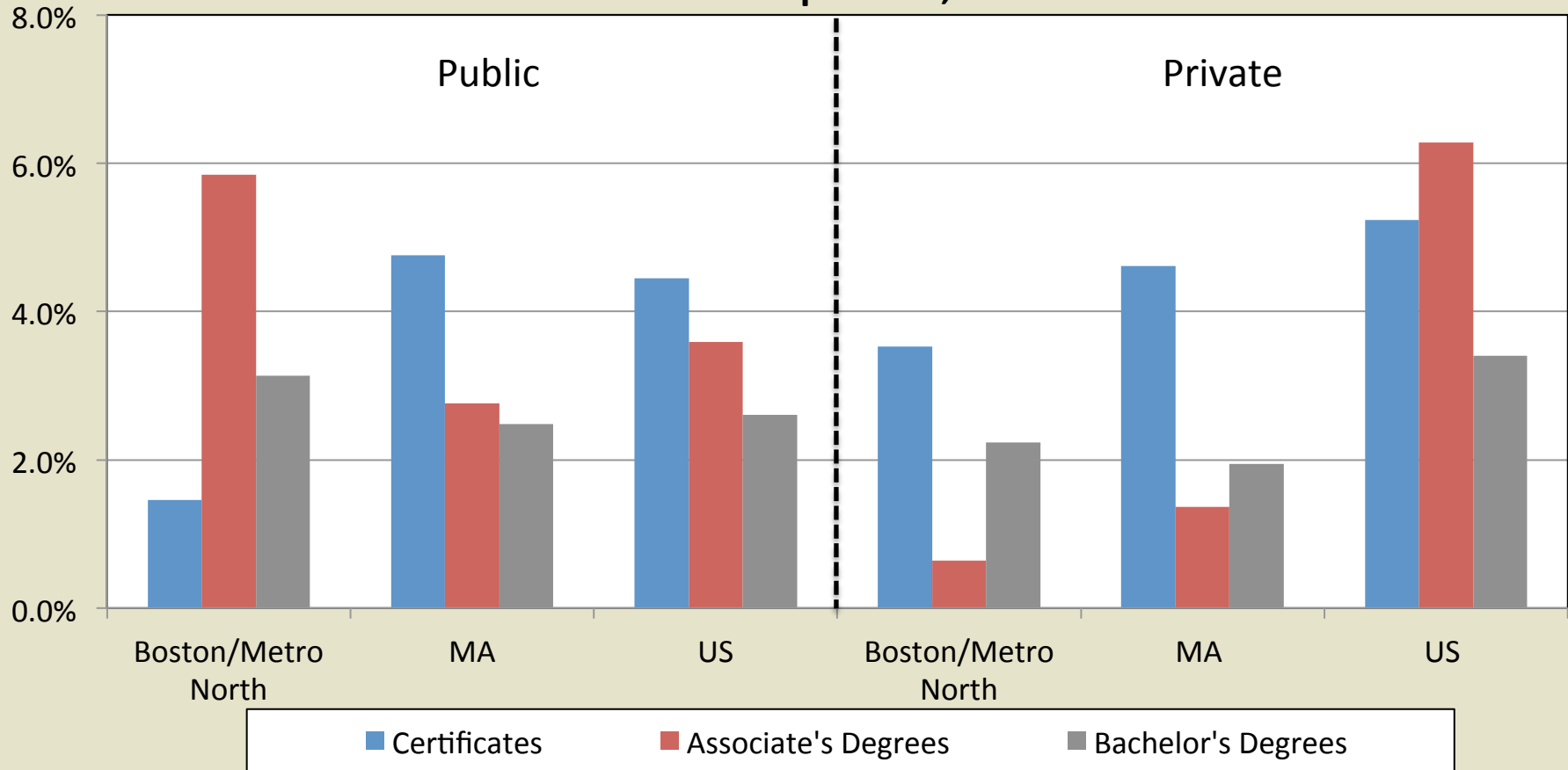
Annual Growth in Completions, 2000 to 2010

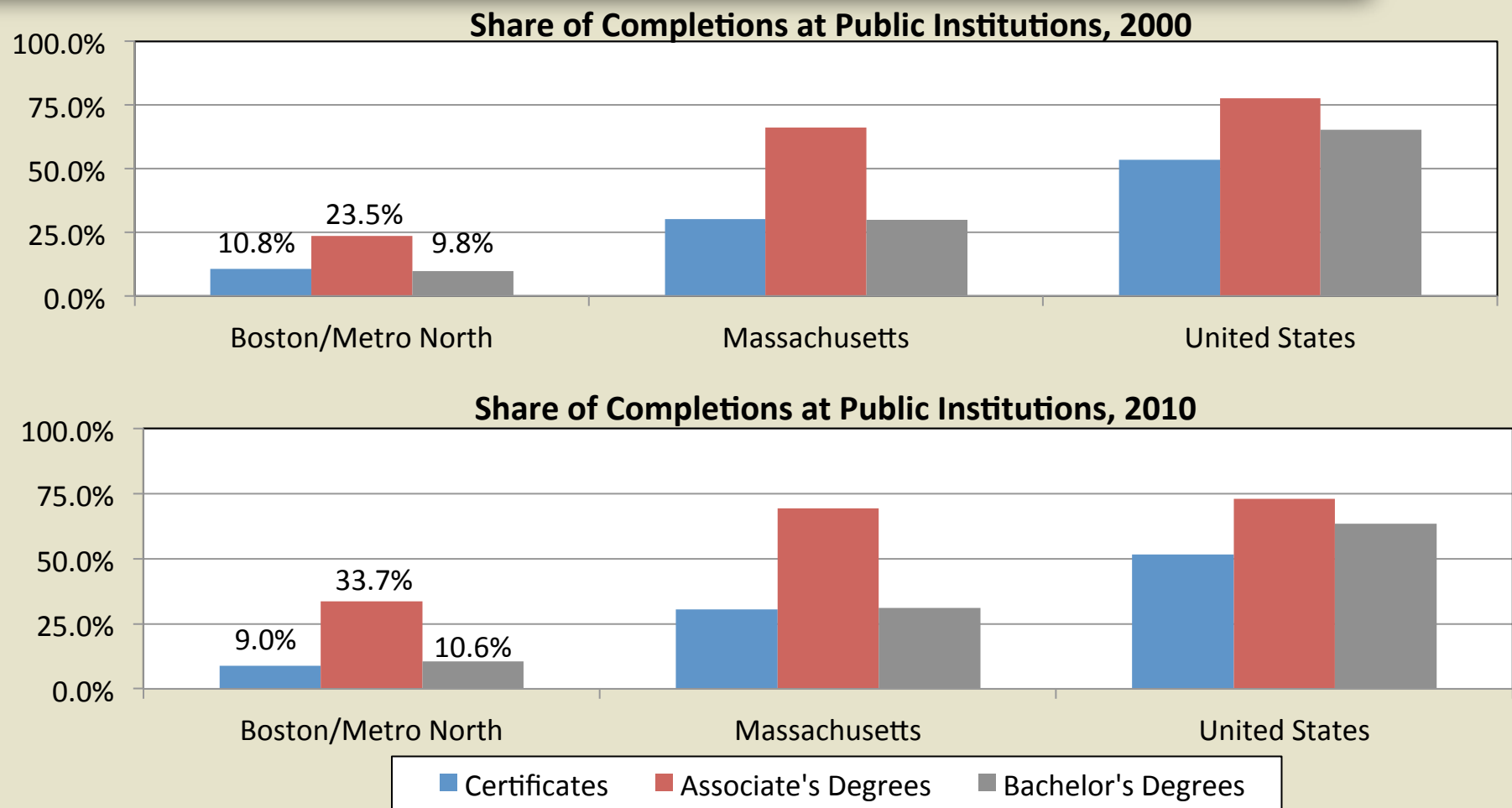
Growth of completions of Associate's and Bachelor's Degrees at public institutions outpaced state and national trends.

Summary

- The region's young and educated labor force helps to mitigate some of the demographic challenges facing other regions.
- The strengthening recovery in Boston/Metro North is increasing demand for post-secondary educated workers in the most highly educated labor market in the state.
- A disproportional share of the unemployed are young and less educated. Those with lower levels of educational attainment face particularly significant barriers to employment in such a highly educated labor market.
- Given such trends, what should be done to ensure the future economic vitality of Boston/Metro North moving forward?

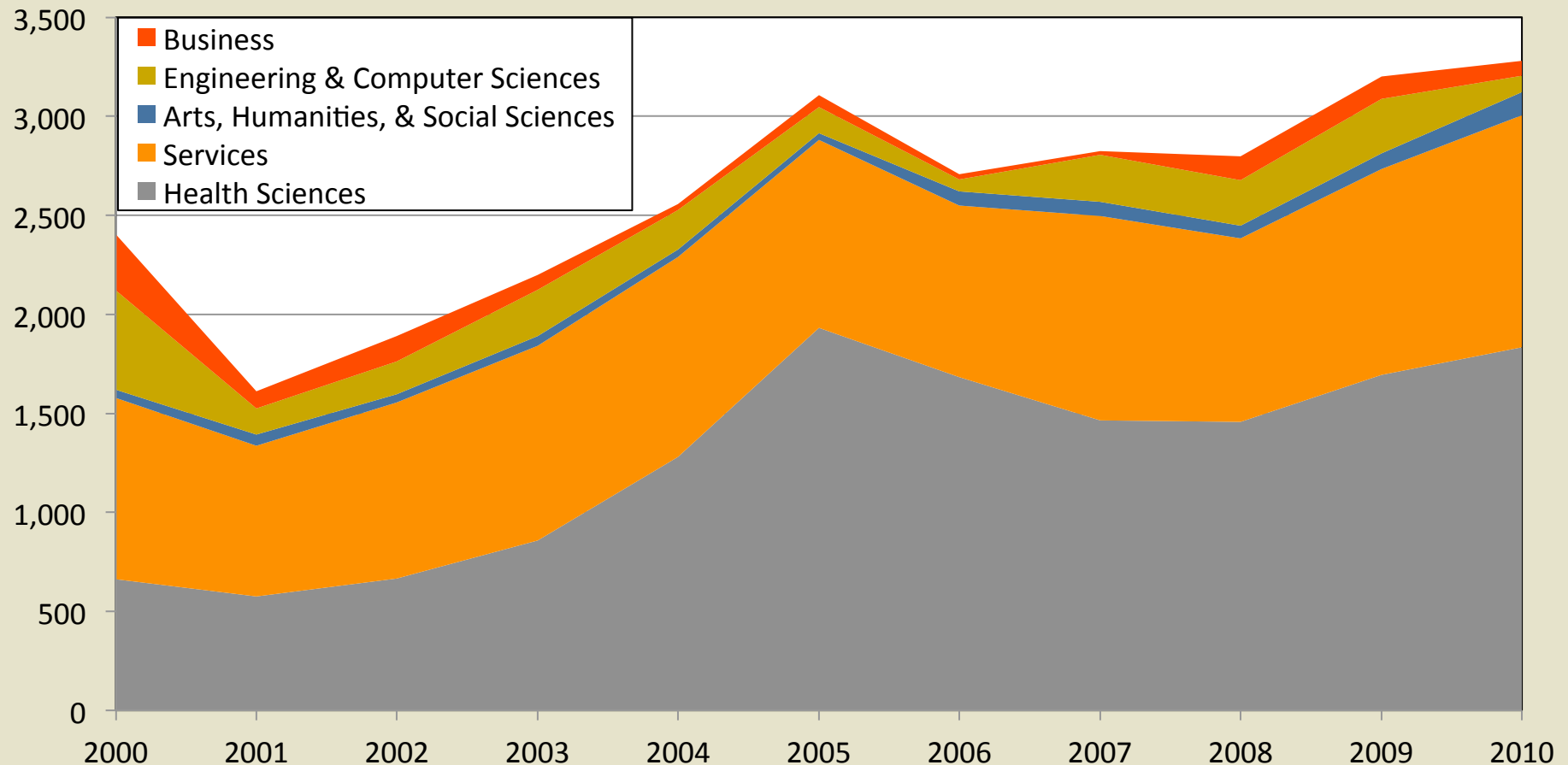

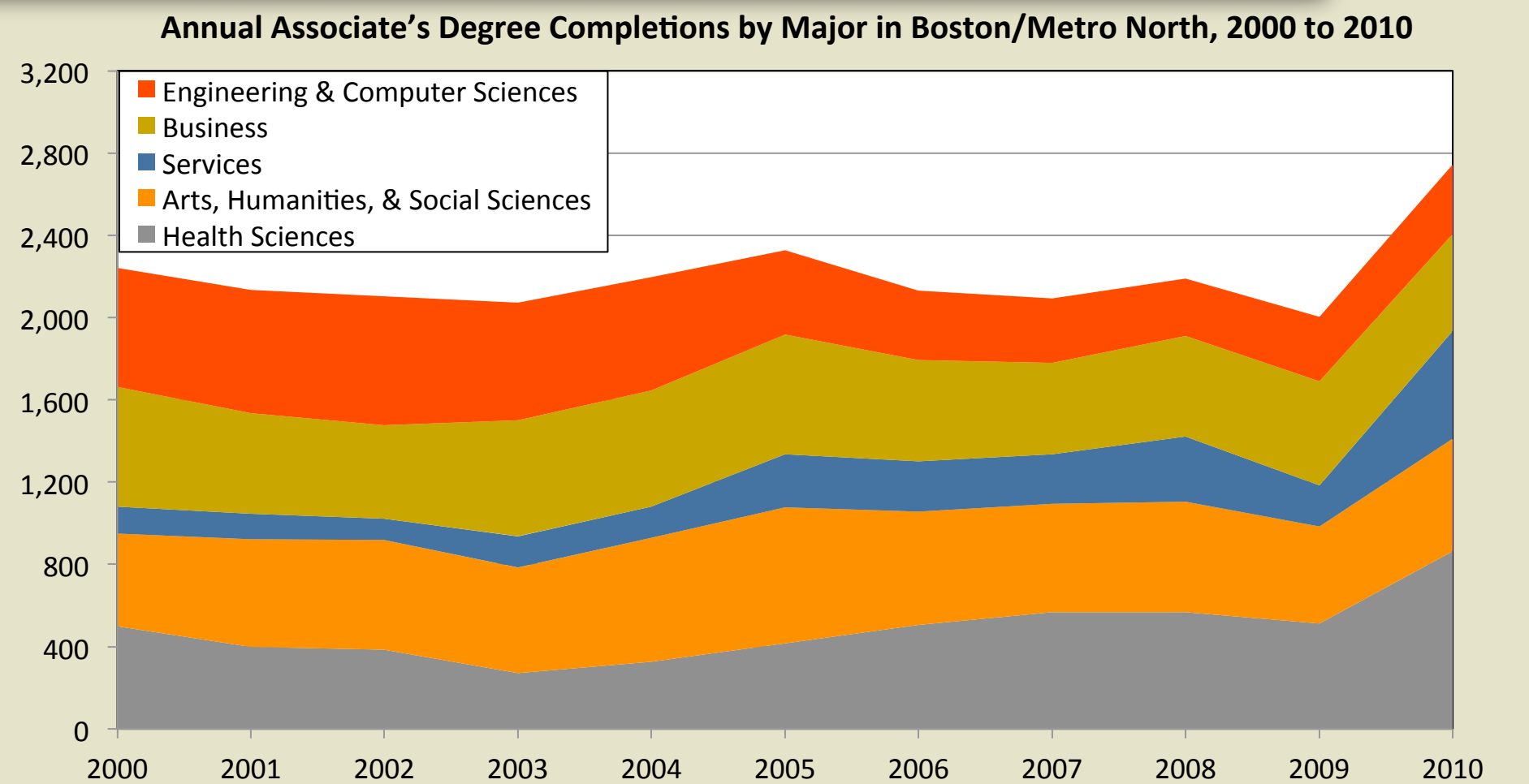
Health Sciences and Services have accounted for most of the Certificates completed in Boston/Metro North.

Annual Certificate Completions by Major in Boston/Metro North, 2000 to 2010



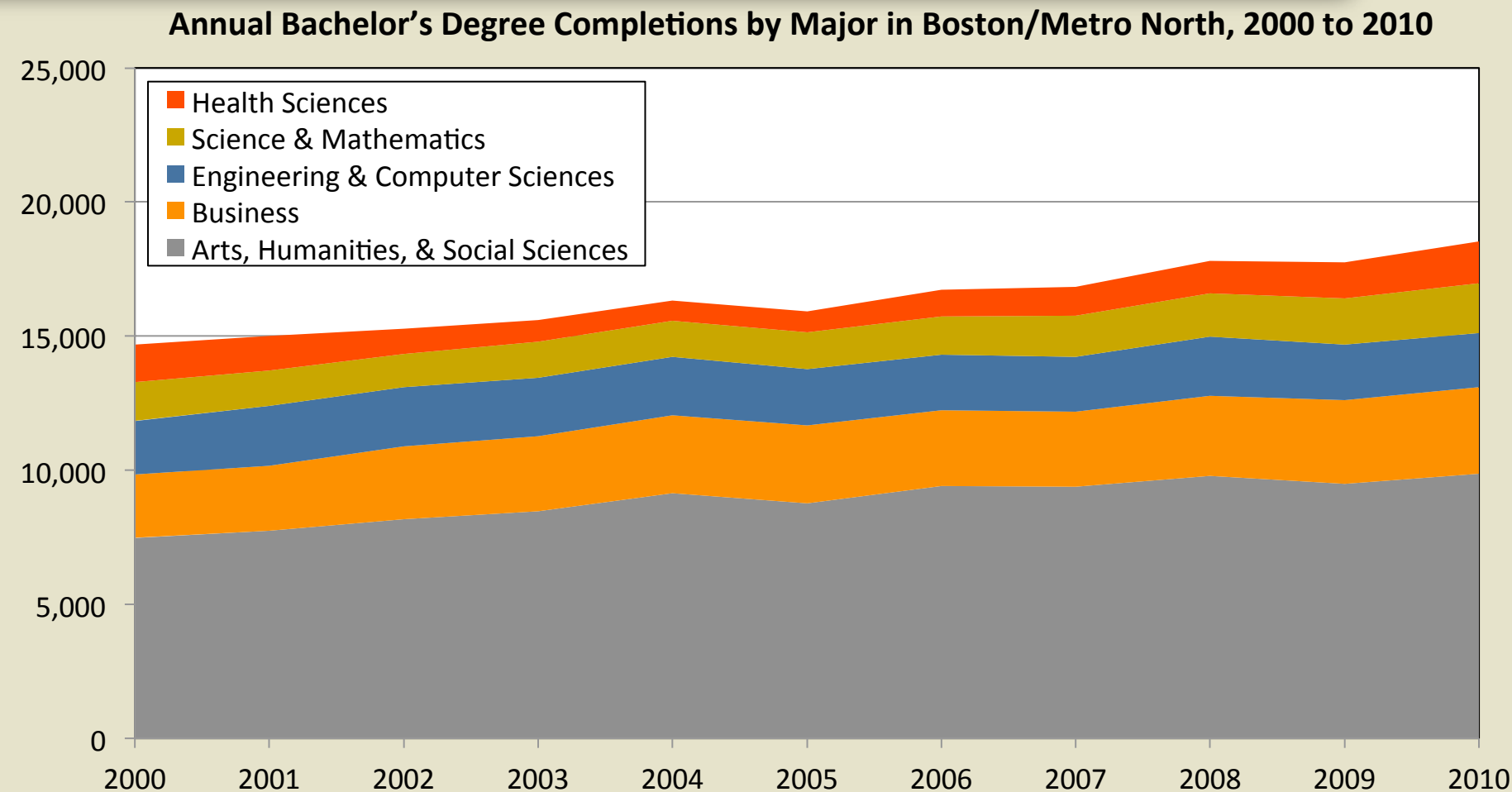
