


# Workforce Training Fund FY17 Annual Report and Performance Report



















The Workforce Training Fund Program (WTFP) helps address business productivity and competitiveness by providing resources to businesses to upgrade the skills of their workers. The WTFP is a program of the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development. The program is administered by Commonwealth Corporation.

CommCorp strengthens the skills of Massachusetts youth and adults by investing in innovative partnerships with industry, education and workforce organizations. It seeks to meet the immediate and emerging needs of businesses and workers so they can thrive in our dynamic economy.

The enabling legislation for the Workforce Training Fund (Massachusetts General Law Chapter 29 Section 2RR) requires that the Director of the Department of Career Services provide the Joint Committee on Labor and Workforce Development and the House and Senate Ways and Means Committees with a report by September 1 of each year detailing grants made in the fiscal year ending on the preceding June 30. The legislation also requires the Director to prepare a performance evaluation of the workforce training fund grants awarded.

The purpose of the Workforce Training Fund is to provide resources to Massachusetts' businesses and workers to train current and newly hired employees, supporting businesses' productivity and competitiveness. We are pleased to report that the 125 employers that completed training initiatives through the WTFP General Program in FY17 collectively added new jobs at a rate of <u>8.21 percent</u> over their two-year grant periods, compared to 3.09 percent statewide, and 2.9 percent across New England. At the start of their grants, these employers projected that they would add 890 workers as a result of WTFP-funded training. By the end, they actually added 1,591 workers (179% of planned).

The Commonwealth Corporation administers the grant program which is funded through an assessment on Massachusetts' employers' Unemployment Insurance contributions. The Workforce Training Fund Advisory Board provides input on polices and reviews Commonwealth Corporation's recommendations for grant awards to businesses. (Attachment 1 provides a list of FY17 Advisory Board members.)

In FY17 the Workforce Training Fund Program offered four types of grants to Massachusetts businesses. Businesses receiving grant funds or benefiting from grant funds must contribute to the Workforce Training Fund. These grants are supporting training for thousands of workers and improving the competitiveness and productivity of hundreds of businesses across the Commonwealth.

The four types of grants are detailed below:

- 1. <u>General Program Training Grant</u>: Businesses of any size are eligible to apply. (Intermediaries may lead a consortium application.) They may request up to \$250,000 for up to two years to support training for their workforce. Grant funds must be matched dollar-for-dollar. The match may be cash or in-kind (including wages paid to employees during training).
- 2. Express Program Grant: Businesses with 100 or fewer employees are eligible to apply. Grant funds will pay for up to 50% of the cost of an employee's participation in training courses selected from a database of registered courses. Businesses may receive up to \$30,000 per calendar year; the maximum payment per trainee, per course is \$3,000.
- 3. <u>Direct Access Program</u>: Businesses of any size are eligible to participate. Training organizations across Massachusetts are selected through a competitive procurement process to offer seats in their training programs to employees of Massachusetts businesses. The programs offer training in topics such as continuous improvement, computer skills, supervisory skills, ESOL and manufacturing

skills. Grant funds pay 100% of the cost of a training seat; a participating business must pay its employees' wages for 100% of the time they spend in training that is funded through the grant.

4. On the Job Training Program: This pilot program began in this fiscal year. Grant funds are intended to support businesses in hiring and training Massachusetts residents who have been unemployed for 30 weeks or longer. Businesses work with a participating Career Center to recruit eligible job-seekers, develop a training plan, and receive a wage subsidy of up to 75% (a maximum of \$7,500) for training the new employee over a period of up to 26 weeks. The Regional Employment Board of Hampden County is managing the statewide program; the Regional Employment Board and participating career centers are paid a service fee for each individual who is enrolled in the program and is retained in training for at least 4 weeks.

**Part One** of this report provides information regarding the Workforce Training Fund grants awarded in FY17. In FY17, more than \$21 million in training grants were awarded through the Workforce Training Fund's four grant programs.

**Part Two** of this report provides data on the performance of Workforce Training Fund General Program grants that were awarded by Commonwealth Corporation in FY17 or in previous years and completed their activities in FY17.

#### PART ONE: GRANTS AWARDED IN FY17

#### FY17 General Program Training Grant Awards

In FY17, Commonwealth Corporation awarded 178 General Program Training Grants involving 206 businesses. (Note: this includes 9 consortium grants involving 36 businesses.) The total amount awarded was \$17,954,768. In total, the businesses plan to train 10,852 workers with these funds. (Attachment 2 provides a list of all General Program Training Grants awarded in FY17.) The businesses projected that as a result of the training, by the end of their two-year grant periods they will hire 1,413 additional workers. Training topics included but were not limited to process and quality improvement, preparation for international industry standards certification, sales and customer service, supervision and leadership, technical and business software, blueprint reading and geometric tolerancing, and project management.

#### FY17 Express Program Grant Awards

In FY17 Commonwealth Corporation approved 512 grant applications from 388 businesses, seeking a total of \$2,398,173 in grant funds to train 3,164 employees. (Note: businesses may submit multiple applications; employees may participate in multiple courses.)

Training topics included process and quality improvement, preparation for international industry standards certification, sales and customer service, supervision and leadership, occupation specific technical training, and project management.

#### FY17 Direct Access Program

This program, which began as a pilot program in FY15, provides businesses with streamlined access to training in topics that have substantial and frequent demand, such as supervisory and management skills, process improvement and quality assurance, computer skills, manufacturing skills, and ESOL. Through a competitive procurement process, Commonwealth Corporation originally selected 10 training organizations to offer Massachusetts businesses seats for their employees in a set of pre-approved programs. The training organizations market the opportunity and enroll and train workers referred by the businesses. Commonwealth Corporation reimburses the training organizations with WTFP grant funds for training costs on a per seat basis. Referring businesses do not pay any of the training costs but are required to pay their workers' wages for any time spent in training that is paid for with the grant. The initial group of 10 organizations completed their contracts in FY17, at which time they had collectively trained 3,561 workers. (Note: the number of participants is not unduplicated. Participants may enroll in multiple training courses.) More than 400 businesses enrolled their employees in the programs. The total reimbursement amount for the training activities was \$1,906,383.

In FY17 Commonwealth Corporation conducted a new competitive procurement process to identify additional training organizations and programs and also awarded continuation grants to 8 of the 10 original training organizations. Currently 18 organizations are offering training seats through the Direct Access Program to businesses across the Commonwealth. This new round of funding, which totals \$2,434,409 and provides for 5,392 training slots, is designed to provide businesses with access to training through the end of FY18. By the end of FY17, the 18 organizations had collectively trained 2,080 workers from 260 businesses and had been reimbursed \$826,686.

#### FY17 OJT Program Grant Awards

Beginning in the spring of FY17 five businesses each worked with a career center to hire and begin training a previously long-term unemployed individual through the WTFP OJT program. The age range of the participants is between 23 and 60; their lengths of unemployment ranged from 30 weeks to 166 weeks. The occupations in which they were hired are office assistant, receptionist, maintenance, reclamation worker and medical equipment specialist; their training wages range from \$12 to \$16 per hour. By the end of FY17, of the 5 individuals who began working and participating in training:


- 1 completed the training period and was retained by her employer in an office assistant position paying \$13.50 per hour;
- 1 did not complete the training period and was not retained in employment;
- 3 were still participating in training.

The total expended in the OJT program by the end of FY17 was \$26,858 (\$22,808 in wage subsidies and \$4,050 in service fees to career centers and the Regional Employment Board of Hampden County.)


#### PART TWO: WTFP GENERAL PROGRAM GRANTS CLOSED IN FY17

#### **General Program Training Grants Closed in FY17**


In FY17, 125 General Program Training Grants closed. In total, the 125 grantees projected adding 890 workers as a result of training; the actual number of net new jobs (full-time equivalent) they reported at the end of their grant period was 1,591, which is 701 more new jobs (179% of planned) than projected. Overall, the grantees reported 8.21% employment growth over their two-year grant period as compared to 3.09% statewide.




Ninety-two of the grantees reported net new jobs as compared to the beginning of their grant period. Thirteen reported that their employment levels remained steady and 20 reported that they experienced job loss over the course of the grant. The following charts provide information about the projected versus actual count of reported new jobs created, by Workforce Development Board region and by industry.



Note: The Central MA region includes a grant involving several manufacturing companies that experienced a net reduction of 229 workers due to a decline in orders. The companies participating in the other 12 grants in the region reported that they added 41 new jobs as a result of their programs.





The total original contract amount for the 125 grantees was \$11,904,334; the final total amount expended at the end of the grant periods was \$10,329,243 (87% of the contracted amount). Eighty-two of the 125 grantees did not expend their full contract amount. In total, the 125 grantees planned to train 9,470 employees; the actual number of trainees reported was 9,169 (97% of planned). Eighty of the 125 grantees trained as many as or more employees than planned; 45 did not train as many workers as originally planned. The latter group of grantees reported that changes in business circumstances affected their ability to conduct all of the training they had originally planned. The following table provides information about the number of trainees by Workforce Development Board region.
